HB 1928 expands the Visiting Scholars teaching certificate to allow the State Board of Education to grant temporary teaching certificates that will enable school leaders to employ subject-matter experts in hard-to-staff schools or hard-to-teach subject areas. Data from the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) highlights areas of need from across the state. One of the most egregious shortage areas is high school physics. From October 2020 to December 2021, DESE issued two teaching certificates in physics. At the same time, there were 155 less than fully qualified teachers reported teaching physics in Missouri. Shortages are not limited to mathematics and science. Content areas such as fine arts and foreign language are also seeing fewer prospective teachers with teaching certificates in those areas. From October 2020 to December 2021, DESE issued only 34 teaching certificates for Spanish and 7 for French. Traditional educator preparation programs alone will not be able to meet this demand. In the last decade, the number of graduates from educator preparation programs has declined by approximately 25% (4,795 in 2010-11 to 3,651 in 2019-20). Students deserve every opportunity for access to courses and teachers that will help prepare them for success after graduation. HB 1928 will give school leaders additional options to help meet teacher shortage needs and bring qualified professionals to the classroom to share their skills and expertise.
