

HB 641 -- Controlled Substances

This bill changes the laws regarding the designation of controlled substances. In its main provisions, the bill:

(1) Changes the definition of "marijuana" to include any synthetic cannabinoids, indole, analogues, homologues, molecular derivatives, and side chains;

(2) Adds the following to the list of controlled substances in Schedule I:

(a) 5-(1,1-dimethylheptyl)-2-[(1R,3S)-3-hydroxycyclohexyl]-phenol (CP-47,497);

(b) 1,1-Dimethylheptyl-11-hydroxytetrahydrocannabinol;

(c) 5-(1,1-dimethyloctyl)-2-[(1R,3S)-3-hydroxycyclohexyl]-phenol (cannabicyclohexanol; CP-47,497 C8 homologue);

(d) 1-hexyl-3-(1-naphthoyl)indole;

(e) Mephradone (4-methylmethcathinone);

(f) 4-Methyl-alpha-pyrrolidinobutyrophenone;

(g) (2-methyl-1-propyl-1H-indol-3-yl)-1-naphthalenyl-methanone;

(h) [1-[2-(4-morpholinyl)ethyl]-1H-indol-3-yl]-1-naphthalenyl-methanone;

(i) 1-[2-(4-morpholinyl)ethyl]-3-(1-naphthoyl)indole (JWH-200);

(j) 1-pentyl-3-(4-chloro-1-naphthoyl)indole;

(k) 1-(1-pentyl-1H-indol-3-yl)-2-(2-methoxyphenyl)-ethanone;

(l) 1-pentyl-3-(2-methoxyphenylacetyl)indole; and

(m) Methylenedioxypropylone or [(MPDV) (1-(1,3-Benzodioxol-5-yl)-2-(1-pyrrolidinyl)-1-pentanone], commonly known as bath salts; and

(3) Specifies that any analogue or homologue of a Schedule I controlled substance will be treated as a controlled substance in Schedule I for the purposes of any state law.
