1 AMEND House Committee Substitute for House Bill No. 1526, Page 2, Section 160.045, Line 17,
2 by adding after all of said section and line the following:

3 "163.011. As used in this chapter unless the context requires otherwise:

4 (1) "Adjusted operating levy", the sum of tax rates for the current year for teachers' and
5 incidental funds for a school district as reported to the proper officer of each county pursuant to
6 section 164.011;

7 (2) "Aggregate proration factor", the total formula appropriation under subsections 1, 2,
8 and 8 of section 163.031 for any given fiscal year divided by the amount that would be necessary
9 to fund the entire entitlement calculation determined by subsections 1 and 2 of section 163.031 for
10 the same fiscal year;

11 (3) "Average daily attendance", the quotient or the sum of the quotients obtained by
12 dividing the total number of hours attended in a term by resident pupils between the ages of five
13 and twenty-one by the actual number of hours school was in session in that term. To the average
14 daily attendance of the following school term shall be added the full-time equivalent average daily
15 attendance of summer school students. "Full-time equivalent average daily attendance of summer
16 school students" shall be computed by dividing the total number of hours, except for physical
17 education hours that do not count as credit toward graduation for students in grades nine, ten,
18 eleven, and twelve, attended by all summer school pupils by the number of hours required in
19 section 160.011 in the school term. For purposes of determining average daily attendance under
20 this subdivision, the term "resident pupil" shall include all children between the ages of five and
21 twenty-one who are residents of the school district and who are attending kindergarten through
22 grade twelve in such district. If a child is attending school in a district other than the district of
23 residence and the child's parent is teaching in the school district or is a regular employee of the
24 school district which the child is attending, then such child shall be considered a resident pupil of
25 the school district which the child is attending for such period of time when the district of
26 residence is not otherwise liable for tuition. Average daily attendance for students below the age
27 of five years for which a school district may receive state aid based on such attendance shall be
28 computed as regular school term attendance unless otherwise provided by law;

1 [(3)] (4) "Current operating expenditures":

2 (a) For the fiscal year 2007 calculation, "current operating expenditures" shall be
3 calculated using data from fiscal year 2004 and shall be calculated as all expenditures for
4 instruction and support services except capital outlay and debt service expenditures minus the
5 revenue from federal categorical sources; food service; student activities; categorical payments for
6 transportation costs pursuant to section 163.161; state reimbursements for early childhood special
7 education; the career ladder entitlement for the district, as provided for in sections 168.500 to
8 168.515; the vocational education entitlement for the district, as provided for in section 167.332;
9 and payments from other districts;

10 (b) In every fiscal year subsequent to fiscal year 2007, current operating expenditures
11 shall be the amount in paragraph (a) of this subdivision plus any increases in state funding
12 pursuant to sections 163.031 and 163.043 subsequent to fiscal year 2005, not to exceed five
13 percent, per recalculation, of the state revenue received by a district in the 2004-05 school year
14 from the foundation formula, line 14, gifted, remedial reading, exceptional pupil aid, fair share,
15 and free textbook payments for any district from the first preceding calculation of the state
16 adequacy target. Beginning on July 1, 2010, current operating expenditures shall be the amount in
17 paragraph (a) of this subdivision plus any increases in state funding pursuant to sections 163.031
18 and 163.043 subsequent to fiscal year 2005 received by a district in the 2004-05 school year from
19 the foundation formula, line 14, gifted, remedial reading, exceptional pupil aid, fair share, and free
20 textbook payments for any district from the first preceding calculation of the state adequacy target.
21 Beginning on July 1, 2012, current operating expenditures shall be the amount in paragraph (a) of
22 this subdivision plus any increases in state funding under sections 163.031 and 163.043
23 subsequent to fiscal year 2005, not to exceed five percent, per recalculation, of the state revenue
24 received by a district in the 2004-05 school year from the foundation formula, line 14, gifted,
25 remedial reading, exceptional pupil aid, fair share, and free textbook payments for any district
26 from the first preceding calculation of the state adequacy target. The five percent increase limit
27 over the previous calculation shall be applied to the recalculation of the state adequacy target for
28 fiscal years 2013 and 2014, and subsequently;

29 [(4)] (5) "District's tax rate ceiling", the highest tax rate ceiling in effect subsequent to the
30 1980 tax year or any subsequent year. Such tax rate ceiling shall not contain any tax levy for debt
31 service;

32 [(5)] (6) "Dollar-value modifier", an index of the relative purchasing power of a dollar,
33 calculated as one plus fifteen percent of the difference of the regional wage ratio minus one,
34 provided that the dollar value modifier shall not be applied at a rate less than 1.0 provided further
35 that the dollar-value modifier shall be recalculated every fiscal year, beginning in fiscal year 2013,
36 using a three-year simple moving average of the wage data from the fourth, fifth, and sixth years

1 preceding the payment year from the Bureau of Economic Analysis of the United States
2 Department of Commerce, as provided in this subdivision:

3 (a) "County wage per job", the total county wage and salary disbursements divided by the
4 total county wage and salary employment for each county and the city of St. Louis as reported by
5 the Bureau of Economic Analysis of the United States Department of Commerce for the fourth
6 year preceding the payment year;

7 (b) "Regional wage per job":

8 a. The total Missouri wage and salary disbursements of the metropolitan area as defined
9 by the Office of Management and Budget divided by the total Missouri metropolitan wage and
10 salary employment for the metropolitan area for the county signified in the school district number
11 or the city of St. Louis, as reported by the Bureau of Economic Analysis of the United States
12 Department of Commerce for the fourth year preceding the payment year and recalculated upon
13 every decennial census to incorporate counties that are newly added to the description of
14 metropolitan areas; or if no such metropolitan area is established, then:

15 b. The total Missouri wage and salary disbursements of the micropolitan area as defined
16 by the Office of Management and Budget divided by the total Missouri micropolitan wage and
17 salary employment for the micropolitan area for the county signified in the school district number,
18 as reported by the Bureau of Economic Analysis of the United States Department of Commerce
19 for the fourth year preceding the payment year, if a micropolitan area for such county has been
20 established and recalculated upon every decennial census to incorporate counties that are newly
21 added to the description of micropolitan areas; or

22 c. If a county is not part of a metropolitan or micropolitan area as established by the
23 Office of Management and Budget, then the county wage per job, as defined in paragraph (a) of
24 this subdivision, shall be used for the school district, as signified by the school district number;

25 (c) "Regional wage ratio", the ratio of the regional wage per job divided by the state
26 median wage per job;

27 (d) "State median wage per job", the fifty- eighth highest county wage per job;

28 ~~[(6)]~~ (7) "Free and reduced lunch pupil count", the number of pupils eligible for free and
29 reduced lunch on the last Wednesday in January for the preceding school year who were enrolled
30 as students of the district, as approved by the department in accordance with applicable federal
31 regulations;

32 ~~[(7)]~~ (8) "Free and reduced lunch threshold" shall be calculated by dividing the total free
33 and reduced lunch pupil count of every performance district that falls entirely above the bottom
34 five percent and entirely below the top five percent of average daily attendance, when such
35 districts are rank-ordered based on their current operating expenditures per average daily
36 attendance, by the total average daily attendance of all included performance districts;

1 [(8)] (9) "Limited English proficiency pupil count", the number in the preceding school
2 year of pupils aged three through twenty-one enrolled or preparing to enroll in an elementary
3 school or secondary school who were not born in the United States or whose native language is a
4 language other than English or are Native American or Alaskan native, or a native resident of the
5 outlying areas, and come from an environment where a language other than English has had a
6 significant impact on such individuals' level of English language proficiency, or are migratory,
7 whose native language is a language other than English, and who come from an environment
8 where a language other than English is dominant; and have difficulties in speaking, reading,
9 writing, or understanding the English language sufficient to deny such individuals the ability to
10 meet the state's proficient level of achievement on state assessments described in Public Law
11 107-10, the ability to achieve successfully in classrooms where the language of instruction is
12 English, or the opportunity to participate fully in society;

13 [(9)] (10) "Limited English proficiency threshold" shall be calculated by dividing the total
14 limited English proficiency pupil count of every performance district that falls entirely above the
15 bottom five percent and entirely below the top five percent of average daily attendance, when such
16 districts are rank-ordered based on their current operating expenditures per average daily
17 attendance, by the total average daily attendance of all included performance districts;

18 [(10)] (11) "Local effort":

19 (a) For the fiscal year 2007 calculation, "local effort" shall be computed as the equalized
20 assessed valuation of the property of a school district in calendar year 2004 divided by one
21 hundred and multiplied by the performance levy less the percentage retained by the county
22 assessor and collector plus one hundred percent of the amount received in fiscal year 2005 for
23 school purposes from intangible taxes, fines, escheats, payments in lieu of taxes and receipts from
24 state-assessed railroad and utility tax, one hundred percent of the amount received for school
25 purposes pursuant to the merchants' and manufacturers' taxes under sections 150.010 to 150.370,
26 one hundred percent of the amounts received for school purposes from federal properties under
27 sections 12.070 and 12.080 except when such amounts are used in the calculation of federal
28 impact aid pursuant to P.L. 81-874, fifty percent of Proposition C revenues received for school
29 purposes from the school district trust fund under section 163.087, and one hundred percent of
30 any local earnings or income taxes received by the district for school purposes. Under this
31 paragraph, for a special district established under sections 162.815 to 162.940 in a county with a
32 charter form of government and with more than one million inhabitants, a tax levy of zero shall be
33 utilized in lieu of the performance levy for the special school district;

34 (b) In every year subsequent to fiscal year 2007, "local effort" shall be the amount
35 calculated under paragraph (a) of this subdivision plus any increase in the amount received for
36 school purposes from fines. If a district's assessed valuation has decreased subsequent to the

1 calculation outlined in paragraph (a) of this subdivision, the district's local effort shall be
2 calculated using the district's current assessed valuation in lieu of the assessed valuation utilized
3 in the calculation outlined in paragraph (a) of this subdivision;

4 [(11)] (12) "Membership" shall be the average of:

5 (a) The number of resident full-time students and the full-time equivalent number of
6 part-time students who were enrolled in the public schools of the district on the last Wednesday in
7 September of the previous year and who were in attendance one day or more during the preceding
8 ten school days; and

9 (b) The number of resident full-time students and the full-time equivalent number of
10 part-time students who were enrolled in the public schools of the district on the last Wednesday in
11 January of the previous year and who were in attendance one day or more during the preceding ten
12 school days, plus the full-time equivalent number of summer school pupils. "Full-time equivalent
13 number of part-time students" is determined by dividing the total number of hours for which all
14 part-time students are enrolled by the number of hours in the school term. "Full-time equivalent
15 number of summer school pupils" is determined by dividing the total number of hours for which
16 all summer school pupils were enrolled by the number of hours required pursuant to section
17 160.011 in the school term. Only students eligible to be counted for average daily attendance
18 shall be counted for membership;

19 (13) "Modified formula payment", the product of the proration factor and the calculation
20 determined by subsection 1 of section 163.031;

21 (14) "Modified hold harmless payment", the product of the calculation determined by
22 subsection 2 of section 163.031 and the sum of one-third the proration factor plus two-thirds;

23 [(12)] (15) "Operating levy for school purposes", the sum of tax rates levied for teachers'
24 and incidental funds plus the operating levy or sales tax equivalent pursuant to section 162.1100
25 of any transitional school district containing the school district, in the payment year, not including
26 any equalized operating levy for school purposes levied by a special school district in which the
27 district is located;

28 [(13)] (16) "Performance district", any district that has met all performance standards and
29 indicators as established by the department of elementary and secondary education for purposes of
30 accreditation under section 161.092 and as reported on the final annual performance report for that
31 district each year;

32 [(14)] (17) "Performance levy", three dollars and forty-three cents;

33 (18) "Proration factor", a percentage applied to the calculations determined by subsections
34 1 and 2 of section 163.031, prior to subtracting payments from the classroom trust fund, such that
35 the sum total of every payment made to school districts eligible for a modified formula payment
36 combined with the sum total of every payment made to school districts eligible for a modified

1 hold harmless payment shall equal the total formula appropriation for a given fiscal year. The
2 proration factor shall be calculated by the department of elementary and secondary education
3 using the most current available data;

4 [(15)] (19) "School purposes" pertains to teachers' and incidental funds;

5 [(16)] (20) "Special education pupil count", the number of public school students with a
6 current individualized education program or services plan and receiving services from the resident
7 district as of December first of the preceding school year, except for special education services
8 provided through a school district established under sections 162.815 to 162.940 in a county with
9 a charter form of government and with more than one million inhabitants, in which case the sum
10 of the students in each district within the county exceeding the special education threshold of each
11 respective district within the county shall be counted within the special district and not in the
12 district of residence for purposes of distributing the state aid derived from the special education
13 pupil count;

14 [(17)] (21) "Special education threshold" shall be calculated by dividing the total special
15 education pupil count of every performance district that falls entirely above the bottom five
16 percent and entirely below the top five percent of average daily attendance, when such districts are
17 rank- ordered based on their current operating expenditures per average daily attendance, by the
18 total average daily attendance of all included performance districts;

19 [(18)] (22) "State adequacy target", the sum of the current operating expenditures of every
20 performance district that falls entirely above the bottom five percent and entirely below the top
21 five percent of average daily attendance, when such districts are rank-ordered based on their
22 current operating expenditures per average daily attendance, divided by the total average daily
23 attendance of all included performance districts. The department of elementary and secondary
24 education shall first calculate the state adequacy target for fiscal year 2007 and recalculate the
25 state adequacy target every two years using the most current available data. The recalculation
26 shall never result in a decrease from the previous state adequacy target amount. Should a
27 recalculation result in an increase in the state adequacy target amount, fifty percent of that
28 increase shall be included in the state adequacy target amount in the year of recalculation, and
29 fifty percent of that increase shall be included in the state adequacy target amount in the
30 subsequent year[. The state adequacy target may be adjusted to accommodate available
31 appropriations];

32 [(19)] (23) "Teacher", any teacher, teacher-secretary, substitute teacher, supervisor,
33 principal, supervising principal, superintendent or assistant superintendent, school nurse, social
34 worker, counselor or librarian who shall, regularly, teach or be employed for no higher than grade
35 twelve more than one-half time in the public schools and who is certified under the laws

governing the certification of teachers in Missouri;

[(20)] (24) "Weighted average daily attendance", the average daily attendance plus the product of twenty-five hundredths multiplied by the free and reduced lunch pupil count that exceeds the free and reduced lunch threshold, plus the product of seventy-five hundredths multiplied by the number of special education pupil count that exceeds the special education threshold, plus the product of six-tenths multiplied by the number of limited English proficiency pupil count that exceeds the limited English proficiency threshold. For special districts established under sections 162.815 to 162.940 in a county with a charter form of government and with more than one million inhabitants, weighted average daily attendance shall be the average daily attendance plus the product of twenty-five hundredths multiplied by the free and reduced lunch pupil count that exceeds the free and reduced lunch threshold, plus the product of seventy-five hundredths multiplied by the sum of the special education pupil count that exceeds the threshold for each county district, plus the product of six-tenths multiplied by the limited English proficiency pupil count that exceeds the limited English proficiency threshold. None of the districts comprising a special district established under sections 162.815 to 162.940 in a county with a charter form of government and with more than one million inhabitants, shall use any special education pupil count in calculating their weighted average daily attendance.

163.021. 1. A school district shall receive state aid for its education program only if it:

(1) Provides for a minimum of one hundred seventy-four days and one thousand forty-four hours of actual pupil attendance in a term scheduled by the board pursuant to section 160.041 for each pupil or group of pupils, except that the board shall provide a minimum of one hundred seventy-four days and five hundred twenty-two hours of actual pupil attendance in a term for kindergarten pupils. If any school is dismissed because of inclement weather after school has been in session for three hours, that day shall count as a school day including afternoon session kindergarten students. When the aggregate hours lost in a term due to inclement weather decreases the total hours of the school term below the required minimum number of hours by more than twelve hours for all-day students or six hours for one-half-day kindergarten students, all such hours below the minimum must be made up in one-half day or full day additions to the term, except as provided in section 171.033;

(2) Maintains adequate and accurate records of attendance, personnel and finances, as required by the state board of education, which shall include the preparation of a financial statement which shall be submitted to the state board of education the same as required by the provisions of section 165.111 for districts;

(3) Levies an operating levy for school purposes of not less than one dollar and twenty-five cents after all adjustments and reductions on each one hundred dollars assessed valuation of the district;

1 (4) Computes average daily attendance as defined in subdivision (2) of section 163.011
2 as modified by section 171.031. Whenever there has existed within the district an infectious
3 disease, contagion, epidemic, plague or similar condition whereby the school attendance is
4 substantially reduced for an extended period in any school year, the apportionment of school
5 funds and all other distribution of school moneys shall be made on the basis of the school year
6 next preceding the year in which such condition existed; and

7 (5) Certifies annually to the department that it does not award tenure under the provisions
8 of chapter 168.

9 2. For the 2006-07 school year and thereafter, no school district shall receive more state aid, as
10 calculated under subsections 1 and 2 of section 163.031, for its education program, exclusive of
11 categorical add-ons, than it received per weighted average daily attendance for the school year
12 2005-06 from the foundation formula, line 14, gifted, remedial reading, exceptional pupil aid, fair
13 share, and free textbook payment amounts, unless it has an operating levy for school purposes, as
14 determined pursuant to section 163.011, of not less than two dollars and seventy-five cents after
15 all adjustments and reductions. Any district which is required, pursuant to article X, section 22 of
16 the Missouri Constitution, to reduce its operating levy below the minimum tax rate otherwise
17 required under this subsection shall not be construed to be in violation of this subsection for
18 making such tax rate reduction. Pursuant to section 10(c) of article X of the state constitution, a
19 school district may levy the operating levy for school purposes required by this subsection less all
20 adjustments required pursuant to article X, section 22 of the Missouri Constitution if such rate
21 does not exceed the highest tax rate in effect subsequent to the 1980 tax year. Nothing in this
22 section shall be construed to mean that a school district is guaranteed to receive an amount not
23 less than the amount the school district received per eligible pupil for the school year 1990-91.
24 The provisions of this subsection shall not apply to any school district located in a county of the
25 second classification which has a nuclear power plant located in such district or to any school
26 district located in a county of the third classification which has an electric power generation unit
27 with a rated generating capacity of more than one hundred fifty megawatts which is owned or
28 operated or both by a rural electric cooperative except that such school districts may levy for
29 current school purposes and capital projects an operating levy not to exceed two dollars and
30 seventy-five cents less all adjustments required pursuant to article X, section 22 of the Missouri
31 Constitution.

32 3. No school district shall receive more state aid, as calculated in section 163.031, for its
33 education program, exclusive of categorical add-ons, than it received per eligible pupil for the
34 school year 1993-1994, if the state board of education determines that the district was not in
35 compliance in the preceding school year with the requirements of section 163.172, until such time
36 as the board determines that the district is again in compliance with the requirements of section

1 163.172.

2 4. No school district shall receive state aid, pursuant to section 163.031, if such district was
3 not in compliance, during the preceding school year, with the requirement, established pursuant to
4 section 160.530 to allocate revenue to the professional development committee of the district.

5 5. No school district shall receive more state aid, as calculated in subsections 1 and 2 of
6 section 163.031, for its education program, exclusive of categorical add-ons, than it received per
7 weighted average daily attendance for the school year 2005-06 from the foundation formula, line
8 14, gifted, remedial reading, exceptional pupil aid, fair share, and free textbook payment amounts,
9 if the district did not comply in the preceding school year with the requirements of subsection 6 of
10 section 163.031.

11 6. Any school district that levies an operating levy for school purposes that is less than the
12 performance levy, as such term is defined in section 163.011, shall provide written notice to the
13 department of elementary and secondary education asserting that the district is providing an
14 adequate education to the students of such district. If a school district asserts that it is not
15 providing an adequate education to its students, such inadequacy shall be deemed to be a result of
16 insufficient local effort. The provisions of this subsection shall not apply to any special district
17 established under sections 162.815 to 162.940.

18 163.031. 1. The department of elementary and secondary education shall calculate and
19 distribute to each school district qualified to receive state aid under section 163.021 an amount
20 determined by multiplying the district's weighted average daily attendance by the state adequacy
21 target, multiplying this product by the dollar value modifier for the district, and subtracting from
22 this product the district's local effort and[, in years not governed under subsection 4 of this
23 section,] subtracting payments from the classroom trust fund under section 163.043.

24 2. [Other provisions of law to the contrary] Notwithstanding subsection 1 of this section:

25 (1) For districts with an average daily attendance of more than three hundred fifty in the
26 school year preceding the payment year:

27 (a) For the 2006-07 school year, the state revenue per weighted average daily attendance
28 received by a district from the state aid calculation under subsections 1 and 4 of this section, as
29 applicable, and the classroom trust fund under section 163.043 shall not be less than the state
30 revenue received by a district in the 2005-06 school year from the foundation formula, line 14,
31 gifted, remedial reading, exceptional pupil aid, fair share, and free textbook payment amounts
32 multiplied by the sum of one plus the product of one-third multiplied by the remainder of the
33 dollar value modifier minus one, and dividing this product by the weighted average daily
34 attendance computed for the 2005-06 school year;

35 (b) For the 2007-08 school year, the state revenue per weighted average daily attendance
36 received by a district from the state aid calculation under subsections 1 and 4 of this section, as

1 applicable, and the classroom trust fund under section 163.043 shall not be less than the state
2 revenue received by a district in the 2005-06 school year from the foundation formula, line 14,
3 gifted, remedial reading, exceptional pupil aid, fair share, and free textbook payment amounts
4 multiplied by the sum of one plus the product of two-thirds multiplied by the remainder of the
5 dollar value modifier minus one, and dividing this product by the weighted average daily
6 attendance computed for the 2005-06 school year;

7 (c) For the 2008-09 school year, the state revenue per weighted average daily attendance
8 received by a district from the state aid calculation under subsections 1 and 4 of this section, as
9 applicable, and the classroom trust fund under section 163.043 shall not be less than the state
10 revenue received by a district in the 2005-06 school year from the foundation formula, line 14,
11 gifted, remedial reading, exceptional pupil aid, fair share, and free textbook payment amounts
12 multiplied by the dollar value modifier, and dividing this product by the weighted average daily
13 attendance computed for the 2005-06 school year;

14 (d) For each year subsequent to the 2008-09 school year, the amount shall be no less than
15 that computed in paragraph (c) of this subdivision, multiplied by the weighted average daily
16 attendance pursuant to section 163.036, less any increase in revenue received from the classroom
17 trust fund under section 163.043;

18 (2) For districts with an average daily attendance of three hundred fifty or less in the
19 school year preceding the payment year:

20 (a) For the 2006-07 school year, the state revenue received by a district from the state aid
21 calculation under subsections 1 and 4 of this section, as applicable, and the classroom trust fund
22 under section 163.043 shall not be less than the greater of state revenue received by a district in
23 the 2004-05 or 2005-06 school year from the foundation formula, line 14, gifted, remedial
24 reading, exceptional pupil aid, fair share, and free textbook payment amounts multiplied by the
25 sum of one plus the product of one-third multiplied by the remainder of the dollar value modifier
26 minus one;

27 (b) For the 2007-08 school year, the state revenue received by a district from the state aid
28 calculation under subsections 1 and 4 of this section, as applicable, and the classroom trust fund
29 under section 163.043 shall not be less than the greater of state revenue received by a district in
30 the 2004-05 or 2005-06 school year from the foundation formula, line 14, gifted, remedial
31 reading, exceptional pupil aid, fair share, and free textbook payment amounts multiplied by the
32 sum of one plus the product of two-thirds multiplied by the remainder of the dollar value modifier
33 minus one;

34 (c) For the 2008-09 school year, the state revenue received by a district from the state aid
35 calculation under subsections 1 and 4 of this section, as applicable, and the classroom trust fund
36 under section 163.043 shall not be less than the greater of state revenue received by a district in

1 the 2004-05 or 2005-06 school year from the foundation formula, line 14, gifted, remedial
2 reading, exceptional pupil aid, fair share, and free textbook payment amounts multiplied by the
3 dollar value modifier;

4 (d) For each year subsequent to the 2008-09 school year, the amount shall be no less than
5 that computed in paragraph (c) of this subdivision;

6 (3) The department of elementary and secondary education shall make an addition in the
7 payment amount specified in subsection 1 of this section to assure compliance with the provisions
8 contained in this subsection.

9 3. School districts that meet the requirements of section 163.021 shall receive categorical
10 add-on revenue as provided in this subsection. The categorical add-on for the district shall be the
11 sum of: seventy-five percent of the district allowable transportation costs under section 163.161;
12 the career ladder entitlement for the district, as provided for in sections 168.500 to 168.515; the
13 vocational education entitlement for the district, as provided for in section 167.332; and the
14 district educational and screening program entitlements as provided for in sections 178.691 to
15 178.699. The categorical add-on revenue amounts may be adjusted to accommodate available
16 appropriations.

17 4. [In the 2006-07 school year and each school year thereafter for five years, those
18 districts entitled to receive state aid under the provisions of subsection 1 of this section shall
19 receive state aid in an amount as provided in this subsection.

20 (1) For the 2006-07 school year, the amount shall be fifteen percent of the amount of state
21 aid calculated for the district for the 2006-07 school year under the provisions of subsection 1 of
22 this section, plus eighty-five percent of the total amount of state revenue received by the district
23 for the 2005-06 school year from the foundation formula, line 14, gifted, remedial reading,
24 exceptional pupil aid, fair share, and free textbook payments less any amounts received under
25 section 163.043.

26 (2) For the 2007-08 school year, the amount shall be thirty percent of the amount of state
27 aid calculated for the district for the 2007-08 school year under the provisions of subsection 1 of
28 this section, plus seventy percent of the total amount of state revenue received by the district for
29 the 2005-06 school year from the foundation formula, line 14, gifted, remedial reading,
30 exceptional pupil aid, fair share, and free textbook payments less any amounts received under
31 section 163.043.

32 (3) For the 2008-09 school year, the amount of state aid shall be forty-four percent of the
33 amount of state aid calculated for the district for the 2008-09 school year under the provisions of
34 subsection 1 of this section plus fifty-six percent of the total amount of state revenue received by
35 the district for the 2005-06 school year from the foundation formula, line 14, gifted, remedial
36 reading, exceptional pupil aid, fair share, and free textbook payments less any amounts received

1 under section 163.043.

2 (4) For the 2009-10 school year, the amount of state aid shall be fifty-eight percent of the
3 amount of state aid calculated for the district for the 2009-10 school year under the provisions of
4 subsection 1 of this section plus forty-two percent of the total amount of state revenue received by
5 the district for the 2005-06 school year from the foundation formula, line 14, gifted, remedial
6 reading, exceptional pupil aid, fair share, and free textbook payments less any amounts received
7 under section 163.043.

8 (5) For the 2010-11 school year, the amount of state aid shall be seventy-two percent of
9 the amount of state aid calculated for the district for the 2010-11 school year under the provisions
10 of subsection 1 of this section plus twenty- eight percent of the total amount of state revenue
11 received by the district for the 2005-06 school year from the foundation formula, line 14, gifted,
12 remedial reading, exceptional pupil aid, fair share, and free textbook payments less any amounts
13 received under section 163.043.

14 (6) For the 2011-12 school year, the amount of state aid shall be eighty-six percent of the
15 amount of state aid calculated for the district for the 2011-12 school year under the provisions of
16 subsection 1 of this section plus fourteen percent of the total amount of state revenue received by
17 the district for the 2005-06 school year from the foundation formula, line 14, gifted, remedial
18 reading, exceptional pupil aid, fair share, and free textbook payments less any amounts received
19 under section 163.043.

20 (7) (a) Notwithstanding subdivision (18) of section 163.011, the state adequacy target
21 may not be adjusted downward to accommodate available appropriations in any year governed by
22 this subsection.

23 (b) a. For the 2006-07 school year, if a school district experiences a decrease in summer
24 school average daily attendance of more than twenty percent from the district's 2005-06 summer
25 school average daily attendance, an amount equal to the product of the percent reduction that is in
26 excess of twenty percent of the district's summer school average daily attendance multiplied by
27 the funds generated by the district's summer school program in the 2005-06 school year shall be
28 subtracted from the district's current year payment amount.

29 b. For the 2007-08 school year, if a school district experiences a decrease in summer
30 school average daily attendance of more than thirty percent from the district's 2005-06 summer
31 school average daily attendance, an amount equal to the product of the percent reduction that is in
32 excess of thirty percent of the district's summer school average daily attendance multiplied by the
33 funds generated by the district's summer school program in the 2005-06 school year shall be
34 subtracted from the district's payment amount.

35 c. For the 2008-09 school year, if a school district experiences a decrease in summer
36 school average daily attendance of more than thirty-five percent from the district's 2005-06

1 summer school average daily attendance, an amount equal to the product of the percent reduction
2 that is in excess of thirty-five percent of the district's summer school average daily attendance
3 multiplied by the funds generated by the district's summer school program in the 2005-06 school
4 year shall be subtracted from the district's payment amount.

5 d. Notwithstanding the provisions of this paragraph, no such reduction shall be made in
6 the case of a district that is receiving a payment under section 163.044 or any district whose
7 regular school term average daily attendance for the preceding year was three hundred fifty or less.
8

9 e. This paragraph shall not be construed to permit any reduction applied under this
10 paragraph to result in any district receiving a current-year payment that is less than the amount
11 calculated for such district under subsection 2 of this section.

12 (c)] (1) (a) For fiscal year 2014, the general assembly shall appropriate an amount under
13 subsections 1, 2, and 8 of this section that equals or exceeds the formula appropriation under
14 subsections 1, 2, and 4 of this section as it existed in fiscal year 2011;

15 (b) For fiscal year 2015, the general assembly shall appropriate an amount under
16 subsections 1, 2, and 8 of this section that is sufficient to produce an aggregate proration factor of
17 at least .93;

18 (c) For fiscal year 2016, the general assembly shall appropriate an amount under
19 subsections 1, 2, and 8 of this section that is sufficient to produce an aggregate proration factor of
20 at least .96;

21 (d) For fiscal year 2017, the general assembly shall appropriate an amount under
22 subsections 1, 2, and 8 of this section that is sufficient to produce an aggregate proration factor of
23 at least 1.0;

24 (2) If a school district experiences a decrease in its gifted program enrollment of more
25 than twenty percent from its 2005-06 gifted program enrollment in any year governed by this
26 subsection, an amount equal to the product of the percent reduction in the district's gifted program
27 enrollment multiplied by the funds generated by the district's gifted program in the 2005-06
28 school year shall be subtracted from the district's current year payment amount.

29 5. For any school district meeting the eligibility criteria for state aid as established in
30 section 163.021, but which is considered an option district under section 163.042 and therefore
31 receives no state aid, the commissioner of education shall present a plan to the superintendent of
32 the school district for the waiver of rules and the duration of said waivers, in order to promote
33 flexibility in the operations of the district and to enhance and encourage efficiency in the delivery
34 of instructional services as provided in section 163.042.

35 6. (1) No less than seventy-five percent of the state revenue received under the provisions
36 of subsections 1, 2, and 4 of this section shall be placed in the teachers' fund, and the remaining

1 percent of such moneys shall be placed in the incidental fund. No less than seventy-five percent
2 of one-half of the funds received from the school district trust fund distributed under section
3 163.087 shall be placed in the teachers' fund. One hundred percent of revenue received under the
4 provisions of section 163.161 shall be placed in the incidental fund. One hundred percent of
5 revenue received under the provisions of sections 168.500 to 168.515 shall be placed in the
6 teachers' fund.

7 (2) A school district shall spend for certificated compensation and tuition expenditures
8 each year:

9 (a) An amount equal to at least seventy-five percent of the state revenue received under
10 the provisions of subsections 1, 2, and 4 of this section;

11 (b) An amount equal to at least seventy-five percent of one-half of the funds received
12 from the school district trust fund distributed under section 163.087 during the preceding school
13 year; and

14 (c) Beginning in fiscal year 2008, as much as was spent per the second preceding year's
15 weighted average daily attendance for certificated compensation and tuition expenditures the
16 previous year from revenue produced by local and county tax sources in the teachers' fund, plus
17 the amount of the incidental fund to teachers' fund transfer calculated to be local and county tax
18 sources by dividing local and county tax sources in the incidental fund by total revenue in the
19 incidental fund. In the event a district fails to comply with this provision, the amount by which
20 the district fails to spend funds as provided herein shall be deducted from the district's state
21 revenue received under the provisions of subsections 1, 2, and 4 of this section for the following
22 year, provided that the state board of education may exempt a school district from this provision if
23 the state board of education determines that circumstances warrant such exemption.

24 7. If a school district's annual audit discloses that students were inappropriately identified
25 as eligible for free and reduced lunch, special education, or limited English proficiency and the
26 district does not resolve the audit finding, the department of elementary and secondary education
27 shall require that the amount of aid paid pursuant to the weighting for free and reduced lunch,
28 special education, or limited English proficiency in the weighted average daily attendance on the
29 inappropriately identified pupils be repaid by the district in the next school year and shall
30 additionally impose a penalty of one hundred percent of such aid paid on such pupils, which
31 penalty shall also be paid within the next school year. Such amounts may be repaid by the district
32 through the withholding of the amount of state aid.

33 8. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsections 1 and 2 of this section, in any year in
34 which the formula appropriation does not equal the amount necessary to fund the entire
35 entitlement calculation determined by subsections 1 and 2 of this section, each district shall
36 receive the greater of the district's modified formula payment or the district's modified hold

1 harmless payment.” ; and

3 Further amend said bill, Page 15, Section 168.291, Line 15, by inserting after all of said section
4 and line the following:

5 “Section B. Because of the need to provide sufficient guidance on the allocation of
6 appropriate funds, Sections 163.011 and 163.031 of this act are deemed necessary for the
7 immediate preservation of the public health, welfare, peace and safety, and are hereby declared to
8 be an emergency act within the meaning of the constitution, and Sections 163.011 and 163.031 of
9 this act shall be in full force and effect on July 1, 2012, or upon its passage and approval
10 whichever occurs later.” ; and
