1 AMEND House Committee Substitute for House Bill No. 497, Page 1, In the Title, Line 3, by
2 deleting all of said line and inserting in lieu thereof the word, "incentives"; and

3
4 Further amend said bill, page, Section A, Line 2, by inserting after all of said line and section the
5 following:

6 "32.110. 1. Any business firm which engages in the activities of providing physical
7 revitalization, economic development, job training or education for individuals, community services,
8 or crime prevention in the state of Missouri shall receive a tax credit as provided in section 32.115 if
9 the director of the department of economic development annually approves the proposal of the
10 business firm; except that, no proposal shall be approved which does not have the endorsement of the
11 agency of local government within the area in which the business firm is engaging in such activities
12 which has adopted an overall community or neighborhood development plan that the proposal is
13 consistent with such plan. The proposal shall set forth the program to be conducted, the
14 neighborhood area to be served, why the program is needed, the estimated amount to be contributed
15 to the program and the plans for implementing the program. If, in the opinion of the director of the
16 department of economic development, a business firm's contribution can more consistently with the
17 purposes of sections 32.100 to 32.125 be made through contributions to a neighborhood organization
18 as defined in subdivision (13) of section 32.105, tax credits may be allowed as provided in section
19 32.115. The director of the department of economic development is hereby authorized to
20 promulgate rules and regulations for establishing criteria for evaluating such proposals by business
21 firms for approval or disapproval and for establishing priorities for approval or disapproval of such
22 proposals by business firms with the assistance and approval of the director of the department of
23 revenue. The total amount of tax credit granted for programs approved pursuant to sections 32.100
24 to 32.125 shall not exceed fourteen million dollars in fiscal year 1999 and twenty-six million dollars
25 in fiscal year 2000, and any subsequent fiscal year, except as otherwise provided for proposals
26 approved pursuant to section 32.111, 32.112 or 32.117. All tax credits authorized pursuant to the
27 provisions of sections 32.100 to 32.125 may be used as a state match to secure additional federal
28 funding.

29 2. No new tax credits shall be authorized under the provisions of this section after December
30 31, 2015.

31 32.115. 1. The department of revenue shall grant a tax credit, to be applied in the following

2 (1) The annual tax on gross premium receipts of insurance companies in chapter 148;

3 (2) The tax on banks determined pursuant to subdivision (2) of subsection 2 of section
4 148.030;

5 (3) The tax on banks determined in subdivision (1) of subsection 2 of section 148.030;

6 (4) The tax on other financial institutions in chapter 148;

7 (5) The corporation franchise tax in chapter 147;

8 (6) The state income tax in chapter 143; and

9 (7) The annual tax on gross receipts of express companies in chapter 153.

10 2. For proposals approved pursuant to section 32.110:

11 (1) The amount of the tax credit shall not exceed fifty percent of the total amount contributed
12 during the taxable year by the business firm or, in the case of a financial institution, where
13 applicable, during the relevant income period in programs approved pursuant to section 32.110;

14 (2) Except as provided in subsection 2 or 5 of this section, a tax credit of up to seventy
15 percent may be allowed for contributions to programs where activities fall within the scope of
16 special program priorities as defined with the approval of the governor in regulations promulgated
17 by the director of the department of economic development;

18 (3) Except as provided in subsection 2 or 5 of this section, the tax credit allowed for
19 contributions to programs located in any community shall be equal to seventy percent of the total
20 amount contributed where such community is a city, town or village which has fifteen thousand or
21 less inhabitants as of the last decennial census and is located in a county which is either located in:

22 (a) An area that is not part of a standard metropolitan statistical area;

23 (b) A standard metropolitan statistical area but such county has only one city, town or village
24 which has more than fifteen thousand inhabitants; or

25 (c) A standard metropolitan statistical area and a substantial number of persons in such
26 county derive their income from agriculture. Such community may also be in an unincorporated
27 area in such county as provided in subdivision (1), (2) or (3) of this subsection. Except in no case
28 shall the total economic benefit of the combined federal and state tax savings to the taxpayer exceed
29 the amount contributed by the taxpayer during the tax year;

30 (4) Such tax credit allocation, equal to seventy percent of the total amount contributed, shall
31 not exceed four million dollars in fiscal year 1999 and six million dollars in fiscal year 2000 and any
32 subsequent fiscal year. When the maximum dollar limit on the seventy percent tax credit allocation
33 is committed, the tax credit allocation for such programs shall then be equal to fifty percent credit of
34 the total amount contributed. Regulations establishing special program priorities are to be
35 promulgated during the first month of each fiscal year and at such times during the year as the public
36 interest dictates. Such credit shall not exceed two hundred and fifty thousand dollars annually except
37 as provided in subdivision (5) of this subsection. No tax credit shall be approved for any bank, bank
38 and trust company, insurance company, trust company, national bank, savings association, or
39 building and loan association for activities that are a part of its normal course of business. Any tax
40 credit not used in the period the contribution was made may be carried over the next five succeeding
41 calendar or fiscal years until the full credit has been claimed. Except as otherwise provided for

1 proposals approved pursuant to section 32.111, 32.112 or 32.117, in no event shall the total amount
2 of all other tax credits allowed pursuant to sections 32.100 to 32.125 exceed thirty-two million
3 dollars in any one fiscal year, of which six million shall be credits allowed pursuant to section
4 135.460. If six million dollars in credits are not approved, then the remaining credits may be used
5 for programs approved pursuant to sections 32.100 to 32.125. No new tax credits shall be authorized
6 under the provisions of sections 32.110 and 135.460 after December 31, 2015;

7 (5) The credit may exceed two hundred fifty thousand dollars annually and shall not be
8 limited if community services, crime prevention, education, job training, physical revitalization or
9 economic development, as defined by section 32.105, is rendered in an area defined by federal or
10 state law as an impoverished, economically distressed, or blighted area or as a neighborhood
11 experiencing problems endangering its existence as a viable and stable neighborhood, or if the
12 community services, crime prevention, education, job training, physical revitalization or economic
13 development is limited to impoverished persons.

14 3. For proposals approved pursuant to section 32.111:

15 (1) The amount of the tax credit shall not exceed fifty-five percent of the total amount
16 invested in affordable housing assistance activities or market rate housing in distressed communities
17 as defined in section 135.530 by a business firm. Whenever such investment is made in the form of
18 an equity investment or a loan, as opposed to a donation alone, tax credits may be claimed only
19 where the loan or equity investment is accompanied by a donation which is eligible for federal
20 income tax charitable deduction, and where the total value of the tax credits herein plus the value of
21 the federal income tax charitable deduction is less than or equal to the value of the donation. Any tax
22 credit not used in the period for which the credit was approved may be carried over the next ten
23 succeeding calendar or fiscal years until the full credit has been allowed. If the affordable housing
24 units or market rate housing units in distressed communities for which a tax is claimed are within a
25 larger structure, parts of which are not the subject of a tax credit claim, then expenditures applicable
26 to the entire structure shall be reduced on a prorated basis in proportion to the ratio of the number of
27 square feet devoted to the affordable housing units or market rate housing units in distressed
28 communities, for purposes of determining the amount of the tax credit. The total amount of tax
29 credit granted for programs approved pursuant to section 32.111 for the fiscal year beginning July 1,
30 1991, shall not exceed two million dollars, to be increased by no more than two million dollars each
31 succeeding fiscal year, until the total tax credits that may be approved reaches ten million dollars in
32 any fiscal year;

33 (2) For any year during the compliance period indicated in the land use restriction
34 agreement, the owner of the affordable housing rental units for which a credit is being claimed shall
35 certify to the commission that all tenants renting claimed units are income eligible for affordable
36 housing units and that the rentals for each claimed unit are in compliance with the provisions of
37 sections 32.100 to 32.125. The commission is authorized, in its discretion, to audit the records and
38 accounts of the owner to verify such certification;

39 (3) In the case of owner-occupied affordable housing units, the qualifying owner occupant
40 shall, before the end of the first year in which credits are claimed, certify to the commission that the
41 occupant is income eligible during the preceding two years, and at the time of the initial purchase

1 contract, but not thereafter. The qualifying owner occupant shall further certify to the commission,
 2 before the end of the first year in which credits are claimed, that during the compliance period
 3 indicated in the land use restriction agreement, the cost of the affordable housing unit to the occupant
 4 for the claimed unit can reasonably be projected to be in compliance with the provisions of sections
 5 32.100 to 32.125. Any succeeding owner occupant acquiring the affordable housing unit during the
 6 compliance period indicated in the land use restriction agreement shall make the same certification;

7 (4) If at any time during the compliance period the commission determines a project for
 8 which a proposal has been approved is not in compliance with the applicable provisions of sections
 9 32.100 to 32.125 or rules promulgated therefor, the commission may within one hundred fifty days
 10 of notice to the owner either seek injunctive enforcement action against the owner, or seek legal
 11 damages against the owner representing the value of the tax credits, or foreclose on the lien in the
 12 land use restriction agreement, selling the project at a public sale, and paying to the owner the
 13 proceeds of the sale, less the costs of the sale and less the value of all tax credits allowed herein. The
 14 commission shall remit to the director of revenue the portion of the legal damages collected or the
 15 sale proceeds representing the value of the tax credits. However, except in the event of intentional
 16 fraud by the taxpayer, the proposal's certificate of eligibility for tax credits shall not be revoked.

17 4. For proposals approved pursuant to section 32.112, the amount of the tax credit shall not
 18 exceed fifty-five percent of the total amount contributed to a neighborhood organization by business
 19 firms. Any tax credit not used in the period for which the credit was approved may be carried over
 20 the next ten succeeding calendar or fiscal years until the full credit has been allowed. The total
 21 amount of tax credit granted for programs approved pursuant to section 32.112 shall not exceed one
 22 million dollars for each fiscal year.

23 5. The total amount of tax credits used for market rate housing in distressed communities
 24 pursuant to sections 32.100 to 32.125 shall not exceed thirty percent of the total amount of all tax
 25 credits authorized pursuant to sections 32.111 and 32.112."; and

 27 Further amend said bill, Page 3, Section 67.2050, Line 72, by inserting after all of said section and
 28 line the following:

29 "100.850. 1. The approved company shall remit to the board a job development assessment
 30 fee, not to exceed five percent of the gross wages of each eligible employee whose job was created as
 31 a result of the economic development project, or not to exceed ten percent if the economic
 32 development project is located within a distressed community as defined in section 135.530, for the
 33 purpose of retiring bonds which fund the economic development project.

34 2. Any approved company remitting an assessment as provided in subsection 1 of this
 35 section shall make its payroll books and records available to the board at such reasonable times as the
 36 board shall request and shall file with the board documentation respecting the assessment as the
 37 board may require.

38 3. Any assessment remitted pursuant to subsection 1 of this section shall cease on the date
 39 the bonds are retired.

40 4. Any approved company which has paid an assessment for debt reduction shall be allowed
 41 a tax credit equal to the amount of the assessment. The tax credit may be claimed against taxes

1 otherwise imposed by chapters 143 and 148, except withholding taxes imposed under the provisions
 2 of sections 143.191 to 143.265, which were incurred during the tax period in which the assessment
 3 was made.

4 5. In no event shall the aggregate amount of tax credits authorized by subsection 4 of this
 5 section exceed twenty-five million dollars annually. Of such amount, nine hundred fifty thousand
 6 dollars shall be reserved for an approved project for a world headquarters of a business whose
 7 primary function is tax return preparation that is located in any home rule city with more than four
 8 hundred thousand inhabitants and located in more than one county, which amount reserved shall end
 9 in the year of the final maturity of the certificates issued for such approved project.

10 6. The director of revenue shall issue a refund to the approved company to the extent that the
 11 amount of credits allowed in subsection 4 of this section exceeds the amount of the approved
 12 company's income tax.

13 7. No new tax credits shall be authorized under the provisions of this section after December
 14 31, 2015.

15 135.020. 1. A credit for property taxes shall be allowed for the amount provided in section
 16 135.030. If the amount allowable as a credit exceeds the income tax reduced by other credits, then
 17 the excess shall be considered an overpayment of the income tax.

18 2. No new tax credits shall be authorized under the provisions of sections 135.010 to
 19 135.030 after December 31, 2015.

20 135.352. 1. A taxpayer owning an interest in a qualified Missouri project shall, subject to
 21 the limitations provided under the provisions of [subsection] subsections 3 and 4 of this section, be
 22 allowed a state tax credit, whether or not allowed a federal tax credit, to be termed the Missouri
 23 low-income housing tax credit, if the commission issues an eligibility statement for that project.

24 2. For qualified Missouri projects placed in service after January 1, 1997, the Missouri
 25 low-income housing tax credit available to a project shall be such amount as the commission shall
 26 determine is necessary to ensure the feasibility of the project, up to an amount equal to the federal
 27 low-income housing tax credit for a qualified Missouri project, for a federal tax period, and such
 28 amount shall be subtracted from the amount of state tax otherwise due for the same tax period.

29 3. No more than six million dollars in tax credits shall be authorized each fiscal year for
 30 projects financed through tax-exempt bond issuance. The total amount of tax credits eligible to be
 31 awarded for projects that are financed through tax exempt bond issuance shall be reduced for each
 32 year for ten years in equal amounts beginning with the 2017 fiscal year until the total amount of tax
 33 credits authorized is thirty million dollars.

34 4. The total amount of tax credits eligible to be awarded for projects that are not financed
 35 through tax exempt bond issuance shall be reduced each year for ten years in equal amounts
 36 beginning with the 2017 fiscal year until the total amount of tax credits authorized is one hundred
 37 five million dollars.

38 5. The Missouri low-income housing tax credit shall be taken against the taxes and in the
 39 order specified pursuant to section 32.115. The credit authorized by this section shall not be
 40 refundable. Any amount of credit that exceeds the tax due for a taxpayer's taxable year may be
 41 carried back to any of the taxpayer's three prior taxable years or carried forward to any of the

1 taxpayer's five subsequent taxable years.

2 [5.] 6. All or any portion of Missouri tax credits issued in accordance with the provisions of
3 sections 135.350 to 135.362 may be allocated to parties who are eligible pursuant to the provisions
4 of subsection 1 of this section. Beginning January 1, 1995, for qualified projects which began on or
5 after January 1, 1994, an owner of a qualified Missouri project shall certify to the director the
6 amount of credit allocated to each taxpayer. The owner of the project shall provide to the director
7 appropriate information so that the low-income housing tax credit can be properly allocated.

8 [6.] 7. In the event that recapture of Missouri low-income housing tax credits is required
9 pursuant to subsection 2 of section 135.355, any statement submitted to the director as provided in
10 this section shall include the proportion of the state credit required to be recaptured, the identity of
11 each taxpayer subject to the recapture and the amount of credit previously allocated to such taxpayer.

12 [7.] 8. The director of the department may promulgate rules and regulations necessary to
13 administer the provisions of this section. No rule or portion of a rule promulgated pursuant to the
14 authority of this section shall become effective unless it has been promulgated pursuant to the
15 provisions of section 536.024.

16 9. No new tax credits shall be authorized under the provisions of sections 135.350 to
17 135.362 after December 31, 2030.

18 135.750. 1. As used in this section, the following terms mean:

19 (1) "Highly compensated individual", any individual who receives compensation in excess of
20 one million dollars in connection with a single qualified film production project;

21 (2) "Qualified film production project", any film, video, commercial, or television
22 production, as approved by the department of economic development and the office of the Missouri
23 film commission, that is under thirty minutes in length with an expected in-state expenditure budget
24 in excess of fifty thousand dollars, or that is over thirty minutes in length with an expected in-state
25 expenditure budget in excess of one hundred thousand dollars. Regardless of the production costs,
26 "qualified film production project" shall not include any:

27 (a) News or current events programming;

28 (b) Talk show;

29 (c) Production produced primarily for industrial, corporate, or institutional purposes, and for
30 internal use;

31 (d) Sports event or sports program;

32 (e) Gala presentation or awards show;

33 (f) Infomercial or any production that directly solicits funds;

34 (g) Political ad;

35 (h) Production that is considered obscene, as defined in section 573.010;

36 (3) "Qualifying expenses", the sum of the total amount spent in this state for the following
37 by a production company in connection with a qualified film production project:

38 (a) Goods and services leased or purchased by the production company. For goods with a
39 purchase price of twenty-five thousand dollars or more, the amount included in qualifying expenses
40 shall be the purchase price less the fair market value of the goods at the time the production is
41 completed;

1 (b) Compensation and wages paid by the production company on which the production
2 company remitted withholding payments to the department of revenue under chapter 143. For
3 purposes of this section, compensation and wages shall not include any amounts paid to a highly
4 compensated individual;

5 (4) "Tax credit", a credit against the tax otherwise due under chapter 143, excluding
6 withholding tax imposed by sections 143.191 to 143.265, or otherwise due under chapter 148;

7 (5) "Taxpayer", any individual, partnership, or corporation as described in section 143.441,
8 143.471, or section 148.370 that is subject to the tax imposed in chapter 143, excluding withholding
9 tax imposed by sections 143.191 to 143.265, or the tax imposed in chapter 148 or any charitable
10 organization which is exempt from federal income tax and whose Missouri unrelated business
11 taxable income, if any, would be subject to the state income tax imposed under chapter 143.

12 2. For all taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 1999, but ending on or before
13 December 31, 2007, a taxpayer shall be granted a tax credit for up to fifty percent of the amount of
14 investment in production or production-related activities in any film production project with an
15 expected in-state expenditure budget in excess of three hundred thousand dollars. For all taxable
16 years beginning on or after January 1, 2008, a taxpayer shall be allowed a tax credit for up to
17 thirty-five percent of the amount of qualifying expenses in a qualified film production project. Each
18 film production company shall be limited to one qualified film production project per year.
19 Activities qualifying a taxpayer for the tax credit pursuant to this subsection shall be approved by the
20 office of the Missouri film commission and the department of economic development.

21 3. Taxpayers shall apply for the film production tax credit by submitting an application to the
22 department of economic development, on a form provided by the department. As part of the
23 application, the expected in-state expenditures of the qualified film production project shall be
24 documented. In addition, the application shall include an economic impact statement, showing the
25 economic impact from the activities of the film production project. Such economic impact statement
26 shall indicate the impact on the region of the state in which the film production or production-related
27 activities are located and on the state as a whole.

28 4. For all taxable years ending on or before December 31, 2007, tax credits certified pursuant
29 to subsection 2 of this section shall not exceed one million dollars per taxpayer per year, and shall
30 not exceed a total for all tax credits certified of one million five hundred thousand dollars per year.
31 For all taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2008, tax credits certified under subsection 1 of
32 this section shall not exceed a total for all tax credits certified of four million five hundred thousand
33 dollars per year. Taxpayers may carry forward unused credits for up to five tax periods, provided all
34 such credits shall be claimed within ten tax periods following the tax period in which the film
35 production or production-related activities for which the credits are certified by the department
36 occurred.

37 5. Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, any taxpayer may sell, assign,
38 exchange, convey or otherwise transfer tax credits allowed in subsection 2 of this section. The
39 taxpayer acquiring the tax credits may use the acquired credits to offset the tax liabilities otherwise
40 imposed by chapter 143, excluding withholding tax imposed by sections 143.191 to 143.265, or
41 chapter 148. Unused acquired credits may be carried forward for up to five tax periods, provided all

1 such credits shall be claimed within ten tax periods following the tax period in which the film
 2 production or production-related activities for which the credits are certified by the department
 3 occurred.

4 6. [Under section 23.253 of the Missouri sunset act:

5 (1) The provisions of the new program authorized under this section shall automatically
 6 sunset six years after November 28, 2007, unless reauthorized by an act of the general assembly; and

7 (2) If such program is reauthorized, the program authorized under this section shall
 8 automatically sunset twelve years after the effective date of the reauthorization of this section; and

9 (3) This section shall terminate on September first of the calendar year immediately
 10 following the calendar year in which the program authorized under this section is sunset.] No new
 11 tax credits shall be authorized under the provisions of this section after December 31, 2015.

12 143.011. 1. A tax is hereby imposed for every taxable year on the Missouri taxable income
 13 of every resident. The tax shall be determined by applying the tax table or the rate provided in
 14 section 143.021, which is based upon the following rates:

36 2. Beginning with the 2016 calendar year, the department of revenue shall calculate the
 37 amount of additional tax revenue resulting from this act after any revenue reduction required in
 38 subsection 3 of this section. The director of the department of revenue shall, by rule, adjust the tax
 39 brackets under subsection 1 of this section to offset any additional tax revenue so as to produce a
 40 revenue neutral effect. The resulting rates of tax shall be rounded to the nearest tenth of a percent.
 41 The director shall notify the revisor of statutes of any changes to the tax tables of subsection 1 of this

1 section for updating as appropriate.

2 3. (1) Beginning with the 2017 calendar year, the top rate of tax under subsection 1 of this
3 section may be reduced over a period of years. Each reduction in the top rate of tax shall be by
4 one-tenth of a percent and no more than one reduction shall occur in a calendar year. The top rate of
5 tax shall not be reduced below [five] three and one-half percent. Reductions in the rate of tax shall
6 take effect on January first of a calendar year and such reduced rates shall continue in effect until the
7 next reduction occurs.

8 (2) A reduction in the rate of tax shall only occur if the amount of net general revenue
9 collected in the previous fiscal year exceeds the highest amount of net general revenue collected in
10 any of the three fiscal years prior to such fiscal year by at least one hundred fifty million dollars.

11 (3) Any modification of tax rates under this subsection shall only apply to tax years that
12 begin on or after a modification takes effect.

13 (4) The director of the department of revenue shall, by rule, adjust the tax tables under
14 subsection 1 of this section to effectuate the provisions of this subsection. [The bracket for income
15 subject to the top rate of tax shall be eliminated once the top rate of tax has been reduced to five and
16 one-half of a percent.]

17 [3.] 4. Beginning with the 2017 calendar year, the brackets of Missouri taxable income
18 identified in subsection 1 of this section shall be adjusted annually by the percent increase in
19 inflation. The director shall publish such brackets annually beginning on or after October 1, 2016.
20 Modifications to the brackets shall take effect on January first of each calendar year and shall apply
21 to tax years beginning on or after the effective date of the new brackets.

22 [4.] 5. As used in this section, the following terms mean:

23 (1) "CPI", the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers for the United States as
24 reported by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, or its successor index;

25 (2) "CPI for the preceding calendar year", the average of the CPI as of the close of the twelve
26 month period ending on August thirty-first of such calendar year;

27 (3) "Percent increase in inflation", the percentage, if any, by which the CPI for the preceding
28 calendar year exceeds the CPI for the year beginning September 1, 2014, and ending August 31,
29 2015.

30 144.010. 1. The following words, terms, and phrases when used in sections 144.010 to
31 144.525 have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except when the context indicates a
32 different meaning:

33 (1) "Admission" includes seats and tables, reserved or otherwise, and other similar
34 accommodations and charges made therefor and amount paid for admission, exclusive of any
35 admission tax imposed by the federal government or by sections 144.010 to 144.525;

36 (2) "Business" includes any activity engaged in by any person, or caused to be engaged in by
37 him, with the object of gain, benefit or advantage, either direct or indirect, and the classification of
38 which business is of such character as to be subject to the terms of sections 144.010 to 144.525. A
39 person is "engaging in business" in this state for purposes of sections 144.010 to 144.525 if such
40 person "engages in business in this state" or "maintains a place of business in this state" under section
41 144.605. The isolated or occasional sale of tangible personal property, service, substance, or thing,

1 by a person not engaged in such business, does not constitute engaging in business within the
2 meaning of sections 144.010 to 144.525 unless the total amount of the gross receipts from such sales,
3 exclusive of receipts from the sale of tangible personal property by persons which property is sold in
4 the course of the partial or complete liquidation of a household, farm or nonbusiness enterprise,
5 exceeds three thousand dollars in any calendar year. The provisions of this subdivision shall not be
6 construed to make any sale of property which is exempt from sales tax or use tax on June 1, 1977,
7 subject to that tax thereafter;

8 (3) "Captive wildlife", includes but is not limited to exotic partridges, gray partridge,
9 northern bobwhite quail, ring-necked pheasant, captive waterfowl, captive white-tailed deer, captive
10 elk, and captive furbearers held under permit issued by the Missouri department of conservation for
11 hunting purposes. The provisions of this subdivision shall not apply to sales tax on a harvested
12 animal;

13 (4) "Gross receipts", except as provided in section 144.012, means the total amount of the
14 sale price of the sales at retail including any services other than charges incident to the extension of
15 credit that are a part of such sales made by the businesses herein referred to, capable of being valued
16 in money, whether received in money or otherwise; except that, the term "gross receipts" shall not
17 include the sale price of property returned by customers when the full sale price thereof is refunded
18 either in cash or by credit. In determining any tax due under sections 144.010 to 144.525 on the
19 gross receipts, charges incident to the extension of credit shall be specifically exempted. For the
20 purposes of sections 144.010 to 144.525 the total amount of the sale price above mentioned shall be
21 deemed to be the amount received. It shall also include the lease or rental consideration where the
22 right to continuous possession or use of any article of tangible personal property is granted under a
23 lease or contract and such transfer of possession would be taxable if outright sale were made and, in
24 such cases, the same shall be taxable as if outright sale were made and considered as a sale of such
25 article, and the tax shall be computed and paid by the lessee upon the rentals paid;

26 (5) "Livestock", cattle, calves, sheep, swine, ratite birds, including but not limited to, ostrich
27 and emu, aquatic products as defined in section 277.024, llamas, alpaca, buffalo, elk documented as
28 obtained from a legal source and not from the wild, goats, horses, other equine, or rabbits raised in
29 confinement for human consumption;

30 (6) "Motor vehicle leasing company" shall be a company obtaining a permit from the
31 director of revenue to operate as a motor vehicle leasing company. Not all persons renting or leasing
32 trailers or motor vehicles need to obtain such a permit; however, no person failing to obtain such a
33 permit may avail itself of the optional tax provisions of subsection 5 of section 144.070, as
34 hereinafter provided;

35 (7) "Person" includes any individual, firm, copartnership, joint adventure, association,
36 corporation, municipal or private, and whether organized for profit or not, state, county, political
37 subdivision, state department, commission, board, bureau or agency, except the state transportation
38 department, estate, trust, business trust, receiver or trustee appointed by the state or federal court,
39 syndicate, or any other group or combination acting as a unit, and the plural as well as the singular
40 number;

41 (8) "Purchaser" means a person who purchases tangible personal property or to whom are

1 rendered services, receipts from which are taxable under sections 144.010 to 144.525;

2 (9) "Research or experimentation activities" are the development of an experimental or pilot
3 model, plant process, formula, invention or similar property, and the improvement of existing
4 property of such type. Research or experimentation activities do not include activities such as
5 ordinary testing or inspection of materials or products for quality control, efficiency surveys,
6 advertising promotions or research in connection with literary, historical or similar projects;

7 (10) "Sale" or "sales" includes installment and credit sales, and the exchange of properties as
8 well as the sale thereof for money, every closed transaction constituting a sale, and means any
9 transfer, exchange or barter, conditional or otherwise, in any manner or by any means whatsoever, of
10 tangible personal property for valuable consideration and the rendering, furnishing or selling for a
11 valuable consideration any of the substances, things and services herein designated and defined as
12 taxable under the terms of sections 144.010 to 144.525;

13 (11) "Sale at retail" means any transfer made by any person engaged in business as defined
14 herein of the ownership of, or title to, tangible personal property to the purchaser, for use or
15 consumption and not for resale in any form as tangible personal property, for a valuable
16 consideration; except that, for the purposes of sections 144.010 to 144.525 and the tax imposed
17 thereby:

18 (i) purchases of tangible personal property made by duly licensed physicians, dentists,
19 optometrists and veterinarians and used in the practice of their professions shall be deemed to be
20 purchases for use or consumption and not for resale; and

21 (ii) the selling of computer printouts, computer output or microfilm or microfiche and
22 computer-assisted photo compositions to a purchaser to enable the purchaser to obtain for his or her
23 own use the desired information contained in such computer printouts, computer output on
24 microfilm or microfiche and computer-assisted photo compositions shall be considered as the sale of
25 a service and not as the sale of tangible personal property. The provisions of this item shall expire on
26 December 31, 2015.

27 Where necessary to conform to the context of sections 144.010 to 144.525 and the tax
28 imposed thereby, the term "sale at retail" shall be construed to embrace:

29 (a) Sales of admission tickets, cash admissions, charges and fees to or in places of
30 amusement, entertainment and recreation, games and athletic events;

31 (b) Sales of electricity, electrical current, water and gas, natural or artificial, to domestic,
32 commercial or industrial consumers;

33 (c) Sales of local and long distance telecommunications service to telecommunications
34 subscribers and to others through equipment of telecommunications subscribers for the transmission
35 of messages and conversations, and the sale, rental or leasing of all equipment or services pertaining
36 or incidental thereto;

37 (d) Sales of service for transmission of messages by telegraph companies;

38 (e) Sales or charges for all rooms, meals and drinks furnished at any hotel, motel, tavern,
39 inn, restaurant, eating house, drugstore, dining car, tourist camp, tourist cabin, or other place in
40 which rooms, meals or drinks are regularly served to the public;

41 (f) Sales of tickets by every person operating a railroad, sleeping car, dining car, express car,

1 boat, airplane, and such buses and trucks as are licensed by the division of motor carrier and railroad
2 safety of the department of economic development of Missouri, engaged in the transportation of
3 persons for hire;

4 (12) "Seller" means a person selling or furnishing tangible personal property or rendering
5 services, on the receipts from which a tax is imposed pursuant to section 144.020;

6 (13) The noun "tax" means either the tax payable by the purchaser of a commodity or service
7 subject to tax, or the aggregate amount of taxes due from the vendor of such commodities or services
8 during the period for which he or she is required to report his or her collections, as the context may
9 require;

10 (14) "Telecommunications service", for the purpose of this chapter, the transmission of
11 information by wire, radio, optical cable, coaxial cable, electronic impulses, or other similar means.
12 As used in this definition, "information" means knowledge or intelligence represented by any form
13 of writing, signs, signals, pictures, sounds, or any other symbols. Telecommunications service does
14 not include the following if such services are separately stated on the customer's bill or on records of
15 the seller maintained in the ordinary course of business:

16 (a) Access to the internet, access to interactive computer services or electronic publishing
17 services, except the amount paid for the telecommunications service used to provide such access;

18 (b) Answering services and one-way paging services;

19 (c) Private mobile radio services which are not two-way commercial mobile radio services
20 such as wireless telephone, personal communications services or enhanced specialized mobile radio
21 services as defined pursuant to federal law; or

22 (d) Cable or satellite television or music services; and

23 (15) "Product which is intended to be sold ultimately for final use or consumption" means
24 tangible personal property, or any service that is subject to state or local sales or use taxes, or any tax
25 that is substantially equivalent thereto, in this state or any other state.

26 2. For purposes of the taxes imposed under sections 144.010 to 144.525, and any other
27 provisions of law pertaining to sales or use taxes which incorporate the provisions of sections
28 144.010 to 144.525 by reference, the term "manufactured homes" shall have the same meaning given
29 it in section 700.010.

30 3. Sections 144.010 to 144.525 may be known and quoted as the "Sales Tax Law".

31 144.011. 1. For purposes of sections 144.010 to 144.525 and 144.600 to 144.748, and the
32 taxes imposed thereby, the definition of "retail sale" or "sale at retail" shall not be construed to
33 include any of the following:

34 (1) The transfer by one corporation of substantially all of its tangible personal property to
35 another corporation pursuant to a merger or consolidation effected under the laws of the state of
36 Missouri or any other jurisdiction;

37 (2) The transfer of tangible personal property incident to the liquidation or cessation of a
38 taxpayer's trade or business, conducted in proprietorship, partnership or corporate form, except to the
39 extent any transfer is made in the ordinary course of the taxpayer's trade or business;

40 (3) The transfer of tangible personal property to a corporation solely in exchange for its
41 stock or securities;

1 (4) The transfer of tangible personal property to a corporation by a shareholder as a
2 contribution to the capital of the transferee corporation;

3 (5) The transfer of tangible personal property to a partnership solely in exchange for a
4 partnership interest therein;

5 (6) The transfer of tangible personal property by a partner as a contribution to the capital of
6 the transferee partnership;

7 (7) The transfer of tangible personal property by a corporation to one or more of its
8 shareholders as a dividend, return of capital, distribution in the partial or complete liquidation of the
9 corporation or distribution in redemption of the shareholder's interest therein;

10 (8) The transfer of tangible personal property by a partnership to one or more of its partners
11 as a current distribution, return of capital or distribution in the partial or complete liquidation of the
12 partnership or of the partner's interest therein;

13 (9) The transfer of reusable containers used in connection with the sale of tangible personal
14 property contained therein for which a deposit is required and refunded on return. The provisions of
15 this subdivision shall expire on December 31, 2015;

16 (10) The purchase by persons operating eating or food service establishments, of items of a
17 nonreusable nature which are furnished to the customers of such establishments with or in
18 conjunction with the retail sales of their food or beverage. Such items shall include, but not be
19 limited to, wrapping or packaging materials and nonreusable paper, wood, plastic and aluminum
20 articles such as containers, trays, napkins, dishes, silverware, cups, bags, boxes, straws, sticks and
21 toothpicks;

22 (11) The purchase by persons operating hotels, motels or other transient accommodation
23 establishments, of items of a nonreusable nature which are furnished to the guests in the guests'
24 rooms of such establishments and such items are included in the charge made for such
25 accommodations. Such items shall include, but not be limited to, soap, shampoo, tissue and other
26 toiletries and food or confectionery items offered to the guests without charge. The provisions of
27 this subdivision shall expire on December 31, 2015;

28 (12) The transfer of a manufactured home other than:

29 (a) A transfer which involves the delivery of the document known as the "Manufacturer's
30 Statement of Origin" to a person other than a manufactured home dealer, as defined in section
31 700.010, for purposes of allowing such person to obtain a title to the manufactured home from the
32 department of revenue of this state or the appropriate agency or officer of any other state;

33 (b) A transfer which involves the delivery of a "Repossessed Title" to a resident of this state
34 if the tax imposed by sections 144.010 to 144.525 was not paid on the transfer of the manufactured
35 home described in paragraph (a) of this subdivision;

36 (c) The first transfer which occurs after December 31, 1985, if the tax imposed by sections
37 144.010 to 144.525 was not paid on any transfer of the same manufactured home which occurred
38 before December 31, 1985; or

39 (13) Charges for initiation fees or dues to:

40 (a) Fraternal beneficiaries societies, or domestic fraternal societies, orders or associations
41 operating under the lodge system a substantial part of the activities of which are devoted to religious,

1 charitable, scientific, literary, educational or fraternal purposes; or

2 (b) Posts or organizations of past or present members of the Armed Forces of the United
3 States or an auxiliary unit or society of, or a trust or foundation for, any such post or organization
4 substantially all of the members of which are past or present members of the Armed Forces of the
5 United States or who are cadets, spouses, widows, or widowers of past or present members of the
6 Armed Forces of the United States, no part of the net earnings of which inures to the benefit of any
7 private shareholder or individual.

8 2. The assumption of liabilities of the transferor by the transferee incident to any of the
9 transactions enumerated in the above subdivisions (1) to (8) of subsection 1 of this section shall not
10 disqualify the transfer from the exclusion described in this section, where such liability assumption is
11 related to the property transferred and where the assumption does not have as its principal purpose
12 the avoidance of Missouri sales or use tax.

13 144.014. 1. Notwithstanding other provisions of law to the contrary, beginning October 1,
14 1997, and ending December 31, 2015, the tax levied and imposed pursuant to sections 144.010 to
15 144.525 and sections 144.600 to 144.746 on all retail sales of food shall be at the rate of one percent.
16 The revenue derived from the one percent rate pursuant to this section shall be deposited by the state
17 treasurer in the school district trust fund and shall be distributed as provided in section 144.701.

18 2. For the purposes of this section, the term "food" shall include only those products and
19 types of food for which food stamps may be redeemed pursuant to the provisions of the Federal Food
20 Stamp Program as contained in 7 U.S.C. Section 2012, as that section now reads or as it may be
21 amended hereafter, and shall include food dispensed by or through vending machines. For the
22 purpose of this section, except for vending machine sales, the term "food" shall not include food or
23 drink sold by any establishment where the gross receipts derived from the sale of food prepared by
24 such establishment for immediate consumption on or off the premises of the establishment
25 constitutes more than eighty percent of the total gross receipts of that establishment, regardless of
26 whether such prepared food is consumed on the premises of that establishment, including, but not
27 limited to, sales of food by any restaurant, fast food restaurant, delicatessen, eating house, or cafe.

28 3. The provisions of this section shall expire on December 31, 2015.

29 144.020. 1. A tax is hereby levied and imposed for the privilege of titling new and used
30 motor vehicles, trailers, boats, and outboard motors purchased or acquired for use on the highways
31 or waters of this state which are required to be titled under the laws of the state of Missouri and,
32 except as provided in subdivision (9) of this subsection, upon all sellers for the privilege of engaging
33 in the business of selling tangible personal property or rendering taxable service at retail in this state.
34 The rate of tax shall be as follows:

35 (1) Upon every retail sale in this state of tangible personal property, excluding motor
36 vehicles, trailers, motorcycles, mopeds, motortricycles, boats and outboard motors required to be
37 titled under the laws of the state of Missouri and subject to tax under subdivision (9) of this
38 subsection, a tax equivalent to four percent of the purchase price paid or charged, or in case such sale
39 involves the exchange of property, a tax equivalent to four percent of the consideration paid or
40 charged, including the fair market value of the property exchanged at the time and place of the
41 exchange, except as otherwise provided in section 144.025;

1 (2) A tax equivalent to four percent of the amount paid for admission and seating
2 accommodations, or fees paid to, or in any place of amusement, entertainment or recreation, games
3 and athletic events;

4 (3) A tax equivalent to four percent of the basic rate paid or charged on all sales of electricity
5 or electrical current, water and gas, natural or artificial, to domestic, commercial or industrial
6 consumers;

7 (4) A tax equivalent to four percent on the basic rate paid or charged on all sales of local and
8 long distance telecommunications service to telecommunications subscribers and to others through
9 equipment of telecommunications subscribers for the transmission of messages and conversations
10 and upon the sale, rental or leasing of all equipment or services pertaining or incidental thereto;
11 except that, the payment made by telecommunications subscribers or others, pursuant to section
12 144.060, and any amounts paid for access to the internet or interactive computer services shall not be
13 considered as amounts paid for telecommunications services prior to December 31, 2015;

14 (5) A tax equivalent to four percent of the basic rate paid or charged for all sales of services
15 for transmission of messages of telegraph companies;

16 (6) A tax equivalent to four percent on the amount of sales or charges for all rooms, meals
17 and drinks furnished at any hotel, motel, tavern, inn, restaurant, eating house, drugstore, dining car,
18 tourist cabin, tourist camp or other place in which rooms, meals or drinks are regularly served to the
19 public;

20 (7) A tax equivalent to four percent of the amount paid or charged for intrastate tickets by
21 every person operating a railroad, sleeping car, dining car, express car, boat, airplane and such buses
22 and trucks as are licensed by the division of motor carrier and railroad safety of the department of
23 economic development of Missouri, engaged in the transportation of persons for hire;

24 (8) A tax equivalent to four percent of the amount paid or charged for rental or lease of
25 tangible personal property, provided that if the lessor or renter of any tangible personal property had
26 previously purchased the property under the conditions of "sale at retail" or leased or rented the
27 property and the tax was paid at the time of purchase, lease or rental, the lessor, sublessor, renter or
28 subrenter shall not apply or collect the tax on the subsequent lease, sublease, rental or subrental
29 receipts from that property. The purchase, rental or lease of motor vehicles, trailers, motorcycles,
30 mopeds, motortricycles, boats, and outboard motors shall be taxed and the tax paid as provided in
31 this section and section 144.070. In no event shall the rental or lease of boats and outboard motors
32 be considered a sale, charge, or fee to, for or in places of amusement, entertainment or recreation nor
33 shall any such rental or lease be subject to any tax imposed to, for, or in such places of amusement,
34 entertainment or recreation. Rental and leased boats or outboard motors shall be taxed under the
35 provisions of the sales tax laws as provided under such laws for motor vehicles and trailers. Tangible
36 personal property which is exempt from the sales or use tax under section 144.030 upon a sale
37 thereof is likewise exempt from the sales or use tax upon the lease or rental thereof;

38 (9) A tax equivalent to four percent of the purchase price, as defined in section 144.070, of
39 new and used motor vehicles, trailers, boats, and outboard motors purchased or acquired for use on
40 the highways or waters of this state which are required to be registered under the laws of the state of
41 Missouri. This tax is imposed on the person titling such property, and shall be paid according to the

1 procedures in section 144.440.

2 2. All tickets sold which are sold under the provisions of sections 144.010 to 144.525 which
3 are subject to the sales tax shall have printed, stamped or otherwise endorsed thereon, the words
4 "This ticket is subject to a sales tax."

5 144.030. 1. There is hereby specifically exempted from the provisions of sections 144.010
6 to 144.525 and from the computation of the tax levied, assessed or payable pursuant to sections
7 144.010 to 144.525 such retail sales as may be made in commerce between this state and any other
8 state of the United States, or between this state and any foreign country, and any retail sale which the
9 state of Missouri is prohibited from taxing pursuant to the Constitution or laws of the United States
10 of America, and such retail sales of tangible personal property which the general assembly of the
11 state of Missouri is prohibited from taxing or further taxing by the constitution of this state.

12 2. There are also specifically exempted from the provisions of the local sales tax law as
13 defined in section 32.085, section 238.235, and sections 144.010 to 144.525 and 144.600 to 144.761
14 and from the computation of the tax levied, assessed or payable pursuant to the local sales tax law as
15 defined in section 32.085, section 238.235, and sections 144.010 to 144.525 and 144.600 to 144.745:

16 (1) Motor fuel or special fuel subject to an excise tax of this state, unless all or part of such
17 excise tax is refunded pursuant to section 142.824; or upon the sale at retail of fuel to be consumed in
18 manufacturing or creating gas, power, steam, electrical current or in furnishing water to be sold
19 ultimately at retail; or feed for livestock or poultry; or grain to be converted into foodstuffs which are
20 to be sold ultimately in processed form at retail; or seed, limestone or fertilizer which is to be used
21 for seeding, liming or fertilizing crops which when harvested will be sold at retail or will be fed to
22 livestock or poultry to be sold ultimately in processed form at retail; economic poisons registered
23 pursuant to the provisions of the Missouri pesticide registration law (sections 281.220 to 281.310)
24 which are to be used in connection with the growth or production of crops, fruit trees or orchards
25 applied before, during, or after planting, the crop of which when harvested will be sold at retail or
26 will be converted into foodstuffs which are to be sold ultimately in processed form at retail;

27 (2) Materials, manufactured goods, machinery and parts which when used in manufacturing,
28 processing, compounding, mining, producing or fabricating become a component part or ingredient
29 of the new personal property resulting from such manufacturing, processing, compounding, mining,
30 producing or fabricating and which new personal property is intended to be sold ultimately for final
31 use or consumption; and materials, including without limitation, gases and manufactured goods,
32 including without limitation slagging materials and firebrick, which are ultimately consumed in the
33 manufacturing process by blending, reacting or interacting with or by becoming, in whole or in part,
34 component parts or ingredients of steel products intended to be sold ultimately for final use or
35 consumption;

36 (3) Materials, replacement parts and equipment purchased for use directly upon, and for the
37 repair and maintenance or manufacture of, motor vehicles, watercraft, railroad rolling stock or
38 aircraft engaged as common carriers of persons or property;

39 (4) Motor vehicles registered in excess of fifty-four thousand pounds, and the trailers pulled
40 by such motor vehicles, that are actually used in the normal course of business to haul property on
41 the public highways of the state, and that are capable of hauling loads commensurate with the motor

1 vehicle's registered weight; and the materials, replacement parts, and equipment purchased for use
2 directly upon, and for the repair and maintenance or manufacture of such vehicles. For purposes of
3 this subdivision, "motor vehicle" and "public highway" shall have the meaning as ascribed in section
4 390.020;

5 (5) Replacement machinery, equipment, and parts and the materials and supplies solely
6 required for the installation or construction of such replacement machinery, equipment, and parts,
7 used directly in manufacturing, mining, fabricating or producing a product which is intended to be
8 sold ultimately for final use or consumption; and machinery and equipment, and the materials and
9 supplies required solely for the operation, installation or construction of such machinery and
10 equipment, purchased and used to establish new, or to replace or expand existing, material recovery
11 processing plants in this state. For the purposes of this subdivision, a "material recovery processing
12 plant" means a facility that has as its primary purpose the recovery of materials into a usable product
13 or a different form which is used in producing a new product and shall include a facility or
14 equipment which are used exclusively for the collection of recovered materials for delivery to a
15 material recovery processing plant but shall not include motor vehicles used on highways. For
16 purposes of this section, the terms motor vehicle and highway shall have the same meaning pursuant
17 to section 301.010. Material recovery is not the reuse of materials within a manufacturing process or
18 the use of a product previously recovered. The material recovery processing plant shall qualify
19 under the provisions of this section regardless of ownership of the material being recovered;

20 (6) Machinery and equipment, and parts and the materials and supplies solely required for
21 the installation or construction of such machinery and equipment, purchased and used to establish
22 new or to expand existing manufacturing, mining or fabricating plants in the state if such machinery
23 and equipment is used directly in manufacturing, mining or fabricating a product which is intended
24 to be sold ultimately for final use or consumption;

25 (7) Tangible personal property which is used exclusively in the manufacturing, processing,
26 modification or assembling of products sold to the United States government or to any agency of the
27 United States government;

28 (8) Animals or poultry used for breeding or feeding purposes, or captive wildlife;

29 (9) Newsprint, ink, computers, photosensitive paper and film, toner, printing plates and other
30 machinery, equipment, replacement parts and supplies used in producing newspapers published for
31 dissemination of news to the general public;

32 (10) The rentals of films, records or any type of sound or picture transcriptions for public
33 commercial display. The provisions of this subdivision shall expire on December 31, 2015;

34 (11) Pumping machinery and equipment used to propel products delivered by pipelines
35 engaged as common carriers;

36 (12) Railroad rolling stock for use in transporting persons or property in interstate commerce
37 and motor vehicles licensed for a gross weight of twenty-four thousand pounds or more or trailers
38 used by common carriers, as defined in section 390.020, in the transportation of persons or property;

39 (13) Electrical energy used in the actual primary manufacture, processing, compounding,
40 mining or producing of a product, or electrical energy used in the actual secondary processing or
41 fabricating of the product, or a material recovery processing plant as defined in subdivision (5) of

1 this subsection, in facilities owned or leased by the taxpayer, if the total cost of electrical energy so
2 used exceeds ten percent of the total cost of production, either primary or secondary, exclusive of the
3 cost of electrical energy so used or if the raw materials used in such processing contain at least
4 twenty-five percent recovered materials as defined in section 260.200. There shall be a rebuttable
5 presumption that the raw materials used in the primary manufacture of automobiles contain at least
6 twenty-five percent recovered materials. For purposes of this subdivision, "processing" means any
7 mode of treatment, act or series of acts performed upon materials to transform and reduce them to a
8 different state or thing, including treatment necessary to maintain or preserve such processing by the
9 producer at the production facility;

10 (14) Anodes which are used or consumed in manufacturing, processing, compounding,
11 mining, producing or fabricating and which have a useful life of less than one year;

12 (15) Machinery, equipment, appliances and devices purchased or leased and used solely for
13 the purpose of preventing, abating or monitoring air pollution, and materials and supplies solely
14 required for the installation, construction or reconstruction of such machinery, equipment, appliances
15 and devices;

16 (16) Machinery, equipment, appliances and devices purchased or leased and used solely for
17 the purpose of preventing, abating or monitoring water pollution, and materials and supplies solely
18 required for the installation, construction or reconstruction of such machinery, equipment, appliances
19 and devices;

20 (17) Tangible personal property purchased by a rural water district;

21 (18) All amounts paid or charged for admission or participation or other fees paid by or other
22 charges to individuals in or for any place of amusement, entertainment or recreation, games or

27 revenue-sharing agreements with private persons, firms, or corporations providing goods or services,
28 including management services, in or for the place of amusement, entertainment or recreation, games
29 or athletic events, and provided further that nothing in this subdivision shall exempt from tax any
30 amounts retained by any private person, firm, or corporation under such revenue-sharing agreement.
31 The provisions of this subdivision shall expire on December 31, 2015;

32 (19) All sales of insulin and prosthetic or orthopedic devices as defined on January 1, 1980,
33 by the federal Medicare program pursuant to Title XVIII of the Social Security Act of 1965,
34 including the items specified in Section 1862(a)(12) of that act, and also specifically including
35 hearing aids and hearing aid supplies and all sales of drugs which may be legally dispensed by a
36 licensed pharmacist only upon a lawful prescription of a practitioner licensed to administer those
37 items, including samples and materials used to manufacture samples which may be dispensed by a
38 practitioner authorized to dispense such samples and all sales or rental of medical oxygen, home
39 respiratory equipment and accessories, hospital beds and accessories and ambulatory aids, all sales or
40 rental of manual and powered wheelchairs, stairway lifts, Braille writers, electronic Braille
41 equipment and, if purchased or rented by or on behalf of a person with one or more physical or

8 (20) All sales made by or to religious and charitable organizations and institutions in their
9 religious, charitable or educational functions and activities and all sales made by or to all elementary
10 and secondary schools operated at public expense in their educational functions and activities;

11 (21) All sales of aircraft to common carriers for storage or for use in interstate commerce
12 and all sales made by or to not-for-profit civic, social, service or fraternal organizations, including
13 fraternal organizations which have been declared tax-exempt organizations pursuant to Section
14 501(c)(8) or (10) of the 1986 Internal Revenue Code, as amended, in their civic or charitable
15 functions and activities and all sales made to eleemosynary institutions, and all sales made to penal
16 institutions prior to December 31, 2015, and all sales made to industries of the state, and all sales
17 made to any private not-for-profit institution of higher education not otherwise excluded pursuant to
18 subdivision (20) of this subsection or any institution of higher education supported by public funds,
19 and all sales made to a state relief agency in the exercise of relief functions and activities;

20 (22) All ticket sales made by benevolent, scientific and educational associations which are
21 formed to foster, encourage, and promote progress and improvement in the science of agriculture and
22 in the raising and breeding of animals, and by nonprofit summer theater organizations if such
23 organizations are exempt from federal tax pursuant to the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code
24 and all admission charges and entry fees to the Missouri state fair or any fair conducted by a county
25 agricultural and mechanical society organized and operated pursuant to sections 262.290 to 262.530;

26 (23) All sales made to any private not-for-profit elementary or secondary school, all sales of
27 feed additives, medications or vaccines administered to livestock or poultry in the production of food
28 or fiber, all sales of pesticides used in the production of crops, livestock or poultry for food or fiber,
29 all sales of bedding used in the production of livestock or poultry for food or fiber, all sales of
30 propane or natural gas, electricity or diesel fuel used exclusively for drying agricultural crops,
31 natural gas used in the primary manufacture or processing of fuel ethanol as defined in section
32 142.028, natural gas, propane, and electricity used by an eligible new generation cooperative or an
33 eligible new generation processing entity as defined in section 348.432, and all sales of farm
34 machinery and equipment, other than airplanes, motor vehicles and trailers, and any freight charges
35 on any exempt item. As used in this subdivision, the term "feed additives" means tangible personal
36 property which, when mixed with feed for livestock or poultry, is to be used in the feeding of

19 (29) Computers, computer software and computer security systems purchased for use by
20 architectural or engineering firms headquartered in this state. For the purposes of this subdivision,
21 "headquartered in this state" means the office for the administrative management of at least four
22 integrated facilities operated by the taxpayer is located in the state of Missouri. The provisions of
23 this subdivision shall expire on December 31, 2015;

24 (30) All livestock sales when either the seller is engaged in the growing, producing or
25 feeding of such livestock, or the seller is engaged in the business of buying and selling, bartering or
26 leasing of such livestock;

27 (31) All sales of barges which are to be used primarily in the transportation of property or
28 cargo on interstate waterways;

29 (32) Electrical energy or gas, whether natural, artificial or propane, water, or other utilities
30 which are ultimately consumed in connection with the manufacturing of cellular glass products or in
31 any material recovery processing plant as defined in subdivision (5) of this subsection;

32 (33) Notwithstanding other provisions of law to the contrary, all sales of pesticides or
33 herbicides used in the production of crops, aquaculture, livestock or poultry;

34 (34) Tangible personal property and utilities purchased for use or consumption directly or
35 exclusively in the research and development of agricultural/biotechnology and plant genomics
36 products and prescription pharmaceuticals consumed by humans or animals;

37 (35) All sales of grain bins for storage of grain for resale;

38 (36) All sales of feed which are developed for and used in the feeding of pets owned by a
39 commercial breeder when such sales are made to a commercial breeder, as defined in section
40 273.325, and licensed pursuant to sections 273.325 to 273.357;

41 (37) All purchases by a contractor on behalf of an entity located in another state, provided

1 that the entity is authorized to issue a certificate of exemption for purchases to a contractor under the
2 provisions of that state's laws. For purposes of this subdivision, the term "certificate of exemption"
3 shall mean any document evidencing that the entity is exempt from sales and use taxes on purchases
4 pursuant to the laws of the state in which the entity is located. Any contractor making purchases on

23 relation to such purchases, including but not limited to selection of materials, ordering, pickup,
24 delivery, approval on delivery, taking of delivery, transportation, storage, assumption of risk of loss
25 to materials or providing warranties on materials as specified by contract, use of materials or other
26 purchases for construction of the building or other facility, providing labor, management services,
27 administrative services, design or technical services or advice to the exempt entity, whether or not
28 the contractor or other entity exercises dominion or control in any other manner over the materials in
29 conjunction with services or labor provided to the exempt entity.

30 2. When any exempt entity contracts for the purpose of constructing, repairing or remodeling
31 facilities, and purchases of tangible personal property and materials to be incorporated into or
32 consumed in the construction of the project are to be made on a tax-exempt basis, such entity shall
33 furnish to the contractor an exemption certificate authorizing such purchases for the construction,
34 repair or remodeling project. The form and content of such project exemption certificate shall be
35 approved by the director of revenue. The project exemption certificate shall include but not be
36 limited to:

37 (1) The exempt entity's name, address, Missouri tax identification number and signature of
38 authorized representative;

39 (2) The project location, description, and unique identification number;

40 (3) The date the contract is entered into, which is the earliest date materials may be
41 purchased for the project on a tax-exempt basis;

1 (4) The estimated project completion date; and

2 (5) The certificate expiration date.

3 Such certificate is renewable for a given project at the option of the exempt entity, only for the
4 purpose of revising the certificate expiration date as necessary to complete the project.

5 3. The contractor shall furnish the certificate prescribed in subsection 2 of this section to all
6 subcontractors, and any contractor purchasing materials shall present such certificate to all material
7 suppliers as authorization to purchase, on behalf of the exempt entity, all tangible personal property

9 a tax-exempt basis. Such suppliers shall execute to the purchasing contractor invoices bearing the
10 name of the exempt entity and the project identification number. Nothing in this section shall be

13 property and materials purchased under a project exemption certificate shall be retained by the

25 provided that the demolition is on the property where the voluntary remediation activities are
26 occurring, the demolition is necessary to accomplish the planned use of the facility where the
27 remediation activities are occurring, and the demolition is part of a redevelopment plan approved by
28 the municipal or county government and the department of economic development. The demolition
29 may occur on an adjacent property if the project is located in a municipality which has a population
30 less than twenty thousand and the above conditions are otherwise met. The adjacent property shall
31 independently qualify as abandoned or underutilized. The amount of the credit available for
32 demolition not associated with remediation cannot exceed the total amount of credits approved for
33 remediation including demolition required for remediation.

34 (2) The amount of remediation tax credits issued shall be limited to the least amount

38 (1) That portion of the taxpayer's income attributed to the eligible project; or

39 (2) One hundred percent of the total business' income tax if the eligible facility does not
40 replace a similar facility that closed elsewhere in Missouri prior to the end of the taxpayer's tax
41 period in which the tax credits are earned, and further provided the taxpayer does not operate any

1 other facilities besides the eligible project in Missouri; fifty percent of the total business' income tax
2 if the eligible facility replaces a similar facility that closed elsewhere in Missouri prior to the end of
3 the taxpayer's tax period in which the credits are earned, and further provided the taxpayer does not
4 operate any other facilities besides the eligible project in Missouri; or twenty-five percent of the total
5 business income if the taxpayer operates, in addition to the eligible facility, any other facilities in
6 Missouri. In no case shall a taxpayer operating more than one eligible project in Missouri be allowed
7 to offset more than twenty-five percent of the taxpayer's business income in any tax period. That
8 portion of the taxpayer's income attributed to the eligible project as referenced in subdivision (1) of
9 this subsection, for which the credits allowed in sections 135.110 and 135.225 and subsection 3 of
10 this section, may apply, shall be determined in the same manner as prescribed in subdivision [(6)] (7)
11 of section 135.100. That portion of the taxpayer's franchise tax attributed to the eligible project for
12 which the remediation tax credit may offset, shall be determined in the same manner as prescribed in
13 paragraph (a) of subdivision [(6)] (7) of section 135.100.

14 7. Taxpayers claiming the state tax benefits allowed in subdivisions (2) and (3) of subsection
15 1 of this section shall be required to file all applicable tax credit applications, forms and schedules
16 prescribed by the director during the taxpayer's tax period immediately after the tax period in which
17 the eligible project was first put into use. Otherwise, the taxpayer's right to claim such state tax
18 benefits shall be forfeited. Unused business facility and enterprise zone tax credits shall not be
19 carried forward but shall be initially claimed for the tax period during which the eligible project was
20 first capable of being used, and during any applicable subsequent tax periods.

21 8. Taxpayers claiming the remediation tax credit allowed in subsection 3 of this section shall
22 be required to file all applicable tax credit applications, forms and schedules prescribed by the
23 director during the taxpayer's tax period immediately after the tax period in which the eligible
24 project was first put into use, or during the taxpayer's tax period immediately after the tax period in
25 which the voluntary remediation activities were performed.

26 9. The recipient of remediation tax credits, for the purpose of this subsection referred to as
27 assignor, may assign, sell or transfer, in whole or in part, the remediation tax credit allowed in
28 subsection 3 of this section to any other person, for the purpose of this subsection referred to as
29 assignee. To perfect the transfer, the assignor shall provide written notice to the director of the
30 assignor's intent to transfer the tax credits to the assignee, the date the transfer is effective, the
31 assignee's name, address and the assignee's tax period and the amount of tax credits to be transferred.
32 The number of tax periods during which the assignee may subsequently claim the tax credits shall
33 not exceed twenty tax periods, less the number of tax periods the assignor previously claimed the
34 credits before the transfer occurred.

35 10. In the case where an operator and assignor of an eligible project has been certified to
36 claim state tax benefits allowed in subdivisions (2) and (3) of subsection 1 of this section, and sells
37 or otherwise transfers title of the eligible project to another taxpayer or assignee who continues the
38 same or substantially similar operations at the eligible project, the director shall allow the assignee to
39 claim the credits for a period of time to be determined by the director; except that, the total number
40 of tax periods the tax credits may be earned by the assignor and the assignee shall not exceed ten. To
41 perfect the transfer, the assignor shall provide written notice to the director of the assignor's intent to

1 transfer the tax credits to the assignee, the date the transfer is effective, the assignee's name, address,
2 and the assignee's tax period, and the amount of tax credits to be transferred.

3 11. For the purpose of the state tax benefits described in this section, in the case of a
4 corporation described in section 143.471 or partnership, in computing Missouri's tax liability, such
5 state benefits shall be allowed to the following:

6 (1) The shareholders of the corporation described in section 143.471;

7 (2) The partners of the partnership. The credit provided in this subsection shall be
8 apportioned to the entities described in subdivisions (1) and (2) of this subsection in proportion to
9 their share of ownership on the last day of the taxpayer's tax period.

10 12. No new tax credits shall be authorized under the provisions of this section after
11 December 31, 2015.

12 620.1881. 1. The department of economic development shall respond within thirty days to a
13 company who provides a notice of intent with either an approval or a rejection of the notice of intent.
14 The department shall give preference to qualified companies and projects targeted at an area of the
15 state which has recently been classified as a disaster area by the federal government. Failure to
16 respond on behalf of the department of economic development shall result in the notice of intent
17 being deemed an approval for the purposes of this section. A qualified company who is provided an
18 approval for a project shall be allowed a benefit as provided in this program in the amount and
19 duration provided in this section. A qualified company may receive additional periods for
20 subsequent new jobs at the same facility after the full initial period if the minimum thresholds are
21 met as set forth in sections 620.1875 to 620.1890. There is no limit on the number of periods a
22 qualified company may participate in the program, as long as the minimum thresholds are achieved
23 and the qualified company provides the department with the required reporting and is in proper
24 compliance for this program or other state programs. A qualified company may elect to file a notice
25 of intent to start a new project period concurrent with an existing project period if the minimum
26 thresholds are achieved and the qualified company provides the department with the required
27 reporting and is in proper compliance for this program and other state programs; however, the
28 qualified company may not receive any further benefit under the original approval for jobs created
29 after the date of the new notice of intent, and any jobs created before the new notice of intent may
30 not be included as new jobs for the purpose of benefit calculation in relation to the new approval.
31 When a qualified company has filed and received approval of a notice of intent and subsequently
32 files another notice of intent, the department shall apply the definition of project facility under
33 subdivision (19) of section 620.1878 to the new notice of intent as well as all previously approved
34 notices of intent and shall determine the application of the definitions of new job, new payroll,
35 project facility base employment, and project facility base payroll accordingly.

36 2. Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, any qualified company that is
37 awarded benefits under this program may not simultaneously receive tax credits or exemptions under
38 sections 135.100 to 135.150, sections 135.200 to 135.286, section 135.535, or sections 135.900 to
39 135.906 at the same project facility. The benefits available to the company under any other state
40 programs for which the company is eligible and which utilize withholding tax from the new jobs of
41 the company must first be credited to the other state program before the withholding retention level

1 applicable under the Missouri quality jobs act will begin to accrue. These other state programs
2 include, but are not limited to, the Missouri works jobs training program under sections 620.800 to
3 620.809, the real property tax increment allocation redevelopment act, sections 99.800 to 99.865, or
4 the Missouri downtown and rural economic stimulus act under sections 99.915 to 99.980. If any
5 qualified company also participates in the Missouri works jobs training program in sections 620.800
6 to 620.809, the company shall retain no withholding tax, but the department shall issue a refundable
7 tax credit for the full amount of benefit allowed under this subdivision. The calendar year annual
8 maximum amount of tax credits which may be issued to a qualifying company that also participates
9 in the new job training program shall be increased by an amount equivalent to the withholding tax
10 retained by that company under the new jobs training program. However, if the combined benefits
11 of the quality jobs program and the new jobs training program exceed the projected state benefit of
12 the project, as determined by the department of economic development through a cost-benefit
13 analysis, the increase in the maximum tax credits shall be limited to the amount that would not cause
14 the combined benefits to exceed the projected state benefit. Any taxpayer who is awarded benefits
15 under this program who knowingly hires individuals who are not allowed to work legally in the
16 United States shall immediately forfeit such benefits and shall repay the state an amount equal to any
17 state tax credits already redeemed and any withholding taxes already retained.

18 3. The types of projects and the amount of benefits to be provided are:

19 (1) Small and expanding business projects: in exchange for the consideration provided by
20 the new tax revenues and other economic stimuli that will be generated by the new jobs created by
21 the program, a qualified company may retain an amount equal to the withholding tax as calculated
22 under subdivision (33) of section 620.1878 from the new jobs that would otherwise be withheld and
23 remitted by the qualified company under the provisions of sections 143.191 to 143.265 for a period
24 of three years from the date the required number of new jobs were created if the average wage of the
25 new payroll equals or exceeds the county average wage or for a period of five years from the date the
26 required number of new jobs were created if the average wage of the new payroll equals or exceeds
27 one hundred twenty percent of the county average wage;

28 (2) Technology business projects: in exchange for the consideration provided by the new tax
29 revenues and other economic stimuli that will be generated by the new jobs created by the program,
30 a qualified company may retain an amount equal to a maximum of five percent of new payroll for a
31 period of five years from the date the required number of jobs were created from the withholding tax
32 of the new jobs that would otherwise be withheld and remitted by the qualified company under the
33 provisions of sections 143.191 to 143.265 if the average wage of the new payroll equals or exceeds
34 the county average wage. An additional one-half percent of new payroll may be added to the five
35 percent maximum if the average wage of the new payroll in any year exceeds one hundred twenty
36 percent of the county average wage in the county in which the project facility is located, plus an
37 additional one-half percent of new payroll may be added if the average wage of the new payroll in
38 any year exceeds one hundred forty percent of the average wage in the county in which the project
39 facility is located. The department shall issue a refundable tax credit for any difference between the
40 amount of benefit allowed under this subdivision and the amount of withholding tax retained by the
41 company, in the event the withholding tax is not sufficient to provide the entire amount of benefit

1 due to the qualified company under this subdivision;

2 (3) High impact projects: in exchange for the consideration provided by the new tax
3 revenues and other economic stimuli that will be generated by the new jobs created by the program,
4 a qualified company may retain an amount from the withholding tax of the new jobs that would
5 otherwise be withheld and remitted by the qualified company under the provisions of sections
6 143.191 to 143.265, equal to three percent of new payroll for a period of five years from the date the
7 required number of jobs were created if the average wage of the new payroll equals or exceeds the
8 county average wage of the county in which the project facility is located. For high-impact projects
9 in a facility located within two adjacent counties, the new payroll shall equal or exceed the higher
10 county average wage of the adjacent counties. The percentage of payroll allowed under this
11 subdivision shall be three and one-half percent of new payroll if the average wage of the new payroll
12 in any year exceeds one hundred twenty percent of the county average wage in the county in which
13 the project facility is located. The percentage of payroll allowed under this subdivision shall be four
14 percent of new payroll if the average wage of the new payroll in any year exceeds one hundred forty
15 percent of the county average wage in the county in which the project facility is located. An
16 additional one percent of new payroll may be added to these percentages if local incentives equal
17 between ten percent and twenty-four percent of the new direct local revenue; an additional two
18 percent of new payroll is added to these percentages if the local incentives equal between twenty-five
19 percent and forty-nine percent of the new direct local revenue; or an additional three percent of
20 payroll is added to these percentages if the local incentives equal fifty percent or more of the new
21 direct local revenue. The department shall issue a refundable tax credit for any difference between
22 the amount of benefit allowed under this subdivision and the amount of withholding tax retained by
23 the company, in the event the withholding tax is not sufficient to provide the entire amount of benefit
24 due to the qualified company under this subdivision;

25 (4) Job retention projects: a qualified company may receive a tax credit for the retention of
26 jobs in this state, provided the qualified company and the project meets all of the following
27 conditions:

28 (a) For each of the twenty-four months preceding the year in which application for the
29 program is made the qualified company must have maintained at least one thousand full-time
30 employees at the employer's site in the state at which the jobs are based, and the average wage of
31 such employees must meet or exceed the county average wage;

32 (b) The qualified company retained at the project facility the level of full-time employees
33 that existed in the taxable year immediately preceding the year in which application for the program
34 is made;

35 (c) The qualified company is considered to have a significant statewide effect on the
36 economy, and has been determined to represent a substantial risk of relocation from the state by the
37 quality jobs advisory task force established in section 620.1887; provided, however, until such time
38 as the initial at-large members of the quality jobs advisory task force are appointed, this
39 determination shall be made by the director of the department of economic development;

40 (d) The qualified company in the project facility will cause to be invested a minimum of
41 seventy million dollars in new investment prior to the end of two years or will cause to be invested a

1 minimum of thirty million dollars in new investment prior to the end of two years and maintain an
2 annual payroll of at least seventy million dollars during each of the years for which a credit is
3 claimed; and

4 (e) The local taxing entities shall provide local incentives of at least fifty percent of the new
5 direct local revenues created by the project over a ten-year period.

6 The quality jobs advisory task force may recommend to the department of economic development
7 that appropriate penalties be applied to the company for violating the agreement. The amount of the
8 job retention credit granted may be equal to up to fifty percent of the amount of withholding tax
9 generated by the full-time jobs at the project facility for a period of five years. The calendar year
10 annual maximum amount of tax credit that may be issued to any qualified company for a job
11 retention project or combination of job retention projects shall be seven hundred fifty thousand
12 dollars per year, but the maximum amount may be increased up to one million dollars if such action
13 is proposed by the department and approved by the quality jobs advisory task force established in
14 section 620.1887; provided, however, until such time as the initial at-large members of the quality
15 jobs advisory task force are appointed, this determination shall be made by the director of the
16 department of economic development. In considering such a request, the task force shall rely on
17 economic modeling and other information supplied by the department when requesting the increased
18 limit on behalf of the job retention project. In no event shall the total amount of all tax credits issued
19 for the entire job retention program under this subdivision exceed three million dollars annually.
20 Notwithstanding the above, no tax credits shall be issued for job retention projects approved by the
21 department after August 30, 2013;

22 (5) Small business job retention and flood survivor relief: a qualified company may receive
23 a tax credit under sections 620.1875 to 620.1890 for the retention of jobs and flood survivor relief in
24 this state for each job retained over a three-year period, provided that:

25 (a) The qualified company did not receive any state or federal benefits, incentives, or tax
26 relief or abatement in locating its facility in a flood plain;

27 (b) The qualified company and related companies have fewer than one hundred employees at
28 the time application for the program is made;

29 (c) The average wage of the qualified company's and related companies' employees must
30 meet or exceed the county average wage;

31 (d) All of the qualified company's and related companies' facilities are located in this state;

32 (e) The facilities at the primary business site in this state have been directly damaged by
33 floodwater rising above the level of a five hundred year flood at least two years, but fewer than eight
34 years, prior to the time application is made;

35 (f) The qualified company made significant efforts to protect the facilities prior to any
36 impending danger from rising floodwaters;

37 (g) For each year it receives tax credits under sections 620.1875 to 620.1890, the qualified
38 company and related companies retained, at the company's facilities in this state, at least the level of
39 full-time, year-round employees that existed in the taxable year immediately preceding the year in
40 which application for the program is made; and

41 (h) In the years it receives tax credits under sections 620.1875 to 620.1890, the company

1 cumulatively invests at least two million dollars in capital improvements in facilities and equipment
2 located at such facilities that are not located within a five hundred year flood plain as designated by
3 the Federal Emergency Management Agency, and amended from time to time. The amount of the
4 small business job retention and flood survivor relief credit granted may be equal to up to one
5 hundred percent of the amount of withholding tax generated by the full-time jobs at the project
6 facility for a period of three years. The calendar year annual maximum amount of tax credit that
7 may be issued to any qualified company for a small business job retention and survivor relief project
8 shall be two hundred fifty thousand dollars per year, but the maximum amount may be increased up
9 to five hundred thousand dollars if such action is proposed by the department and approved by the
10 quality jobs advisory task force established in section 620.1887. In considering such a request, the
11 task force shall rely on economic modeling and other information supplied by the department when
12 requesting an increase in the limit on behalf of the small business job retention and flood survivor
13 relief project. In no event shall the total amount of all tax credits issued for the entire small business
14 job retention and flood survivor relief program under this subdivision exceed five hundred thousand
15 dollars annually. Notwithstanding the provisions of this subdivision to the contrary, no tax credits
16 shall be issued for small business job retention and flood survivor relief projects approved by the
17 department after August 30, 2010.

18 4. The qualified company shall provide an annual report of the number of jobs and such
19 other information as may be required by the department to document the basis for the benefits of this
20 program. The department may withhold the approval of any benefits until it is satisfied that proper
21 documentation has been provided, and shall reduce the benefits to reflect any reduction in full-time
22 employees or new payroll. Upon approval by the department, the qualified company may begin the
23 retention of the withholding taxes when it reaches the minimum number of new jobs and the average
24 wage exceeds the county average wage. Tax credits, if any, may be issued upon satisfaction by the
25 department that the qualified company has exceeded the county average wage and the minimum
26 number of new jobs. In such annual report, if the average wage is below the county average wage,
27 the qualified company has not maintained the employee insurance as required, or if the number of
28 new jobs is below the minimum, the qualified company shall not receive tax credits or retain the
29 withholding tax for the balance of the benefit period. In the case of a qualified company that initially
30 filed a notice of intent and received an approval from the department for high-impact benefits and
31 the minimum number of new jobs in an annual report is below the minimum for high-impact
32 projects, the company shall not receive tax credits for the balance of the benefit period but may
33 continue to retain the withholding taxes if it otherwise meets the requirements of a small and
34 expanding business under this program.

35 5. The maximum calendar year annual tax credits issued for the entire program shall not
36 exceed eighty million dollars. Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, the maximum
37 annual tax credits authorized under section 135.535 are hereby reduced from ten million dollars to
38 eight million dollars, with the balance of two million dollars transferred to this program. There shall
39 be no limit on the amount of withholding taxes that may be retained by approved companies under
40 this program.

41 6. The department shall allocate the annual tax credits based on the date of the approval,

1 reserving such tax credits based on the department's best estimate of new jobs and new payroll of the
2 project, and the other factors in the determination of benefits of this program. However, the annual
3 issuance of tax credits is subject to the annual verification of the actual new payroll. The allocation
4 of tax credits for the period assigned to a project shall expire if, within two years from the date of
5 commencement of operations, or approval if applicable, the minimum thresholds have not been
6 achieved. The qualified company may retain authorized amounts from the withholding tax under
7 this section once the minimum new jobs thresholds are met for the duration of the project period. No
8 benefits shall be provided under this program until the qualified company meets the minimum new
9 jobs thresholds. In the event the qualified company does not meet the minimum new job threshold,
10 the qualified company may submit a new notice of intent or the department may provide a new
11 approval for a new project of the qualified company at the project facility or other facilities.

12 7. For a qualified company with flow-through tax treatment to its members, partners, or
13 shareholders, the tax credit shall be allowed to members, partners, or shareholders in proportion to
14 their share of ownership on the last day of the qualified company's tax period.

15 8. Tax credits may be claimed against taxes otherwise imposed by chapters 143 and 148, and
16 may not be carried forward but shall be claimed within one year of the close of the taxable year for
17 which they were issued, except as provided under subdivision (4) of subsection 3 of this section.

18 9. Tax credits authorized by this section may be transferred, sold, or assigned by filing a
19 notarized endorsement thereof with the department that names the transferee, the amount of tax
20 credit transferred, and the value received for the credit, as well as any other information reasonably
21 requested by the department.

22 10. Prior to the issuance of tax credits, the department shall verify through the department of
23 revenue, or any other state department, that the tax credit applicant does not owe any delinquent
24 income, sales, or use tax or interest or penalties on such taxes, or any delinquent fees or assessments
25 levied by any state department and through the department of insurance, financial institutions and
26 professional registration that the applicant does not owe any delinquent insurance taxes. Such
27 delinquency shall not affect the authorization of the application for such tax credits, except that at
28 issuance credits shall be first applied to the delinquency and any amount issued shall be reduced by
29 the applicant's tax delinquency. If the department of revenue or the department of insurance,
30 financial institutions and professional registration, or any other state department, concludes that a
31 taxpayer is delinquent after June fifteenth but before July first of any year and the application of tax
32 credits to such delinquency causes a tax deficiency on behalf of the taxpayer to arise, then the
33 taxpayer shall be granted thirty days to satisfy the deficiency in which interest, penalties, and
34 additions to tax shall be tolled. After applying all available credits toward a tax delinquency, the
35 administering agency shall notify the appropriate department and that department shall update the
36 amount of outstanding delinquent tax owed by the applicant. If any credits remain after satisfying all
37 insurance, income, sales, and use tax delinquencies, the remaining credits shall be issued to the
38 applicant, subject to the restrictions of other provisions of law.

39 11. Except as provided under subdivision (4) of subsection 3 of this section, the director of
40 revenue shall issue a refund to the qualified company to the extent that the amount of credits allowed
41 in this section exceeds the amount of the qualified company's income tax.

1 12. An employee of a qualified company will receive full credit for the amount of tax
2 withheld as provided in section 143.211.

3 13. If any provision of sections 620.1875 to 620.1890 or application thereof to any person or
4 circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity shall not affect other provisions or application of these
5 sections which can be given effect without the invalid provisions or application, and to this end, the
6 provisions of sections 620.1875 to 620.1890 are hereby declared severable.

7 14. The provisions of this section shall expire on December 31, 2027. The total amount of
8 tax credits eligible to be awarded under subsection 5 of this section shall be reduced each year for ten
9 years in equal amounts beginning with the 2017 fiscal year until no tax credits are eligible to be
10 awarded under this section."; and
