

HCS SS#2 SCS SBs 199, 417 & 42 -- JUDICIAL PROCEEDINGS

SPONSOR: Dixon (Cornejo)

COMMITTEE ACTIONS: Voted "Do Pass with Amendments" by the Standing Committee on Civil and Criminal Proceedings by a vote of 9 to 1. Voted "Do Pass with HCS" by the Select Committee on Judiciary by a vote of 7 to 3.

This bill allows the circuit court of Jackson County to establish the Armed Offender Docket Pilot Project. The docket must have dedicated judges and other personnel for specified types of crimes. The circuit court may impose a \$30 surcharge for each criminal case assigned to the docket to be used solely to defray the costs of prosecution, pretrial supervision, and statistical analysis of the cases. A surcharge must not be collected if the proceeding or the defendant has been dismissed by the court or if costs are to be paid by the state, county, or municipality. Within six months after each anniversary of the creation of the docket, the circuit court must provide and publish a report on the operations of the docket during the year immediately preceding the anniversary, including any commentary on the operations as may be offered by a research university in Missouri, prosecuting attorney or public defender in the circuit, or law enforcement agency in the circuit. Any information that is protected from disclosure by a privilege or statute must be disclosed only by court order or as provided by statute.

An individual who is occupying private property under the authority of the property owner must be permitted to use deadly force in specified situations.

Currently, the use of any physical force when making an arrest is not justified unless the arrest is lawful or the officer reasonably believes the arrest is lawful. The bill specifies that the use of any physical force when making an arrest is also not justified unless the amount of force used was objectively reasonable in light of the totality of the particular facts and circumstances confronting the officer on the scene, regardless of the officer's underlying intent or motivation.

Currently, a law enforcement officer is justified in using deadly force in effecting an arrest or in preventing an escape from custody when he or she reasonably believes the force is immediately necessary to effect the arrest or prevent an escape from custody and reasonably believes the suspect has committed or attempted to commit a felony, is attempting to escape by use of a deadly weapon, or may otherwise endanger life or inflict serious physical injury on another person unless arrested without delay. The bill allows a

law enforcement officer to use deadly force in effecting an arrest or preventing an escape from custody when the officer reasonably believes that the use of deadly force is immediately necessary to make the arrest or prevent an escape from custody and reasonably believes that the person has committed or attempted to commit a dangerous or violent felony or a felony involving the infliction or threatened infliction of serious physical injury, is attempting to escape by use of a deadly weapon or dangerous instrument, or may otherwise endanger life or inflict serious physical injury to the officer or others unless arrested without delay.

The provisions of the bill regarding the Armed Offender Docket Pilot Project will expire on December 31, 2021.

The provisions of the bill regarding the use of deadly force contain an emergency clause.

PROPONENTS: Supporters say that there is a gap in protection because victims of excessive force by the government cannot sue under Missouri's, often broader, constitution. The bill will bring consistency and clarity to the law.

Testifying for the bill were Senator Dixon and Matt Selby, Missouri Association of Prosecuting Attorneys.

OPPONENTS: There was no opposition voiced to the committee.

OTHERS: Others testifying on the bill say that the ACLU supports more causes of action against the government. However, the ACLU believes that certain provisions of the bill are ineffective and utilize incorrect standards.

Testifying on the bill was ACLU of Missouri.
