2 Page 9, Section 221.240, Line 7, by inserting immediately after said line the following:

3 "561.021. 1. A person holding any public office, elective or appointive, under the  
4 government of this state or any agency or political subdivision thereof, who is convicted of an  
5 offense shall, upon sentencing, forfeit such office if:

6 (1) He or she is convicted under the laws of this state of a felony or under the laws of  
7 another jurisdiction of an offense which, if committed within this state, would be a felony, or he or  
8 she pleads guilty or nolo contendere of such an offense; or

9 (2) He or she is convicted of or pleads guilty or nolo contendere to an offense involving  
10 misconduct in office, or dishonesty; or

11 (3) The constitution or a statute other than the code so provides.

12 2. Except as provided in subsection 3 of this section, a person who pleads guilty or nolo  
13 contendere or is convicted under the laws of this state of a felony or under the laws of another  
14 jurisdiction of an offense which, if committed within this state, would be a felony, shall be ineligible  
15 to hold any public office, elective or appointive, under the government of this state or any agency or  
16 political subdivision thereof, until the completion of his or her sentence or period of probation.

17 3. Except as provided in subsection 4 of this section, a person who pleads guilty or nolo  
18 contendere or is convicted under the laws of this state or under the laws of another jurisdiction of a  
19 felony connected with the exercise of the right of suffrage shall be forever disqualified from holding  
20 any public office, elective or appointive, under the government of this state or any agency or  
21 political subdivision thereof.

22 4. The provisions of subsection 3 of this section shall not apply to any person who has had  
23 his or her civil rights restored under section 571.075.

24 561.021. 1. A person holding any public office, elective or appointive, under the  
25 government of this state or any agency or political subdivision thereof, who is convicted of a crime  
26 shall, upon sentencing, forfeit such office if:

27 (1) He is convicted under the laws of this state of a felony or under the laws of another  
28 jurisdiction of a crime which, if committed within this state, would be a felony, or he pleads guilty  
29 or nolo contendere of such a crime; or

30 (2) He is convicted of or pleads guilty or nolo contendere to a crime involving misconduct  
31 in office, or dishonesty; or

32 (3) The constitution or a statute other than the code so provides.

33 2. Except as provided in subsection 3 of this section, a person who pleads guilty or nolo  
34 contendere or is convicted under the laws of this state of a felony or under the laws of another  
35 jurisdiction of a crime which, if committed within this state, would be a felony, shall be ineligible to  
36 hold any public office, elective or appointive, under the government of this state or any agency or

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1 political subdivision thereof, until the completion of his sentence or period of probation.

13 (2) Of a felony or misdemeanor connected with the exercise of the right of suffrage shall be  
14 forever disqualified from registering and voting;

15 (3) Of any felony shall be forever disqualified from serving as a juror.

16 2. The provisions of subdivision (2) of subsection 1 of this section shall not apply to any  
17 person who has had his or her civil rights restored under section 571.075.

18 561.026. 1. Notwithstanding any other provision of law except for section 610.140 and  
19 except as provided in subsection 2 of this section, a person who is convicted:

20 (1) Of any crime shall be disqualified from registering and voting in any election under the  
21 laws of this state while confined under a sentence of imprisonment;

22 (2) Of a felony or misdemeanor connected with the exercise of the right of suffrage shall be  
23 forever disqualified from registering and voting;

24 (3) Of any felony shall be forever disqualified from serving as a juror.

25 2. The provisions of subdivision (2) of subsection 1 of this section shall not apply to any  
26 person who has had his or her civil rights restored under section 571.075.

27 571.070. 1. A person commits the crime of unlawful possession of a firearm if such person  
28 knowingly has any firearm in his or her possession and:

29 (1) Such person has been convicted of a felony under the laws of this state, or of a crime  
30 under the laws of any state or of the United States which, if committed within this state, would be a  
31 felony; or

32 (2) Such person is a fugitive from justice, is habitually in an intoxicated or drugged  
33 condition, or is currently adjudged mentally incompetent.

34 2. Unlawful possession of a firearm is a class C felony.

35 3. The provisions of subdivision (1) of subsection 1 of this section shall not apply to:

36 (1) Any person who has had his or her civil right to ship, transport, possess, or receive a  
37 firearm restored under section 571.075 after each crime that would otherwise have been the basis  
38 for a violation of subdivision (1) of subsection 1 of this section; or

39 (2) The possession of an antique firearm.

40 571.075. 1. Except as provided in subsection 2 of this section, any person who has been  
41 deprived of his or her civil right to ship, transport, possess, or receive a firearm because of a  
42 conviction for a felony under the laws of this state or of a crime under the laws of any state or of the  
43 United States which, if committed within this state, would be a felony shall have his or her civil  
44 right to ship, transport, possess, or receive a firearm automatically restored upon such person's  
45 discharge from confinement, probation, or parole, whichever occurs later. The provisions of this  
46 subsection shall not be construed to prevent a court from imposing a sentence requiring a nonviolent  
47 felony offender seeking restoration of his or her civil rights to use the same process for violent  
48 felony offenders under subsection 4 of this section if the offender confesses on the record to violent

1 acts or threats of violence as part of a plea arrangement involving a nonviolent felony offense, or if  
2 the felony offender also pleads guilty or nolo contendere to a related misdemeanor offense involving  
3 violence or the threat of violence.

4 2. The provisions of subsection 1 of this section shall not apply to:

5 (1) Any person who has been convicted of an offense which requires registration as a sex  
6 offender unless such person has been removed from the sex offender registry or exempted from  
7 having to register as a sex offender;

8 (2) Any person convicted of any offense listed in subsection 1 of section 566.147; or

9 (3) Any person who has been convicted of a violent felony as defined in subsection 3 of this  
10 section.

11 3. As used in this section, the term "violent felony" shall mean a felony conviction of any of

20 (6) Involuntary manslaughter in the first and second degrees under section 565.024;

21 (7) Assault in the first degree under section 565.050;

22 (8) Assault in the second degree under section 565.060 until December 31, 2016, and  
23 section 565.052 beginning January 1, 2017;

24 (9) Unlawful endangerment of another under section 565.065 until December 31, 2016, and  
25 creating a danger under section 579.070 beginning January 1, 2017;

26 (10) Assault in the third degree under section 565.070 until December 31, 2016, and section  
27 565.054 beginning January 1, 2017;

28 (11) Domestic assault in the first degree under section 565.072;

29 (12) Domestic assault in the second degree under section 565.073;

30 (13) Domestic assault in the third degree under section 565.074;

31 (14) Assault while on school property under section 565.075 until December 31, 2016;

32 (15) Assault of a law enforcement officer, corrections officer, emergency personnel,

41 (19) Endangering a corrections employee, a visitor to a correctional facility, or another  
42 offender or prisoner under section 565.085 until December 31, 2016, and section 575.155 beginning  
43 January 1, 2017;

45 secure facility, or another offender under section 565.086 until December 31, 2016, and section  
46 575.157 beginning January 1, 2017;

beginning January 1, 2017;

(23) Kidnapping under section 565.110 until December 31, 2016, and kidnapping in the first degree under section 565.110 beginning January 1, 2017;

13       4. Any person who has been convicted of a violent felony as defined in subsection 3 of this  
14 section and who has been deprived of his or her civil right to ship, transport, possess, or receive a  
15 firearm as a result of such conviction may file an application in the circuit court of the county in  
16 which he or she was convicted or in the county in which he or she resides to restore such person's  
17 civil right to ship, transport, possess, or receive a firearm. The court may grant the relief sought if  
18 the applicant has been discharged from confinement, probation, or parole, whichever occurred later,  
19 the conviction occurred five or more years before the filing of the application, the person has not  
20 been convicted at any other time for a felony under the laws of this state or of a crime under the  
21 laws of any state or of the United States which, if committed within this state, would be a felony,  
22 and the court determines that the applicant will not be likely to act in a manner dangerous to the  
23 public safety and that the granting of relief is not contrary to the public interest. If the application is  
24 denied, the person shall not file another application until three years have elapsed without the  
25 permission of the court. If the application is granted, the applicant's civil right to ship, transport,  
26 possess, or receive a firearm shall be restored and the court's order shall so provide."; and
