AN ACT

To repeal section 452.375, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof one new section relating to child custody arrangements.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Section 452.375, RSMo, is repealed and one new section enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as section 452.375, to read as follows:

452.375. 1. As used in this chapter, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

(1) "Custody" means joint legal custody, sole legal custody, joint physical custody or sole physical custody or any combination thereof;

(2) "Joint legal custody" means that the parents share the decision-making rights, responsibilities, and authority relating to the health, education and welfare of the child, and, unless allocated, apportioned, or decreed, the parents shall confer with one another in the exercise of decision-making rights, responsibilities, and authority;

(3) "Joint physical custody" means an order awarding each of the parents significant, but not necessarily equal, periods of time during which a child resides with or is under the care and supervision of each of the parents. Joint physical custody shall be shared by the parents in such a way as to assure the child of frequent, continuing and meaningful contact with both parents;

(4) "Third-party custody" means a third party designated as a legal and physical custodian pursuant to subdivision (5) of subsection 5 of this section.

2. The court shall determine custody in accordance with the best interests of the child. **There shall be a rebuttable presumption that an award of equal or approximately equal parenting time to each parent giving the child equal or approximately equal access to both parents is in the best interest of the child. Such presumption is rebuttable only by clear**

18 **and convincing evidence in accordance with the factors contained in subdivisions (1) to (8)**
19 **of this subsection.** When the parties have not reached an agreement on all issues related to
20 custody, the court shall consider all relevant factors and enter written findings of fact and
21 conclusions of law, including, but not limited to, the following:

22 (1) The wishes of the child's parents as to custody and the proposed parenting plan
23 submitted by both parties;

24 (2) The needs of the child for a frequent, continuing and meaningful relationship with
25 both parents and the ability and willingness of parents to actively perform their functions as
26 mother and father for the needs of the child;

27 (3) The interaction and interrelationship of the child with parents, siblings, and any other
28 person who may significantly affect the child's best interests;

29 (4) Which parent is more likely to allow the child frequent, continuing and meaningful
30 contact with the other parent;

31 (5) The child's adjustment to the child's home, school, and community;

32 (6) The mental and physical health of all individuals involved, including any history of
33 abuse of any individuals involved. If the court finds that a pattern of domestic violence as
34 defined in section 455.010 has occurred, and, if the court also finds that awarding custody to the
35 abusive parent is in the best interest of the child, then the court shall enter written findings of fact
36 and conclusions of law. Custody and visitation rights shall be ordered in a manner that best
37 protects the child and any other child or children for whom the parent has custodial or visitation
38 rights, and the parent or other family or household member who is the victim of domestic
39 violence from any further harm;

40 (7) The intention of either parent to relocate the principal residence of the child; and

41 (8) The wishes of a child as to the child's custodian. The fact that a parent sends his or
42 her child or children to a home school, as defined in section 167.031, shall not be the sole factor
43 that a court considers in determining custody of such child or children.

44 3. (1) In any court proceedings relating to custody of a child, the court shall not award
45 custody or unsupervised visitation of a child to a parent if such parent or any person residing with
46 such parent has been found guilty of, or pled guilty to, any of the following offenses when a child
47 was the victim:

48 (a) A felony violation of section 566.030, 566.032, 566.031, 566.060, 566.062, 566.064,
49 566.067, 566.068, 566.061, 566.083, 566.101, 566.100, 566.111, 566.151, 566.203, 566.206,
50 566.209, 566.211, or 566.215;

51 (b) A violation of section 568.020;

52 (c) A violation of subdivision (2) of subsection 1 of section 568.060;

53 (d) A violation of section 568.065;

54 (e) A violation of section 573.200;

55 (f) A violation of section 573.205; or

56 (g) A violation of section 568.175.

57 (2) For all other violations of offenses in chapters 566 and 568 not specifically listed in
58 subdivision (1) of this subsection or for a violation of an offense committed in another state
59 when a child is the victim that would be a violation of chapter 566 or 568 if committed in
60 Missouri, the court may exercise its discretion in awarding custody or visitation of a child to a
61 parent if such parent or any person residing with such parent has been found guilty of, or pled
62 guilty to, any such offense.

63 4. The general assembly finds and declares that it is the public policy of this state that
64 frequent, continuing and meaningful contact with both parents after the parents have separated
65 or dissolved their marriage is in the best interest of the child, except for cases where the court
66 specifically finds that such contact is not in the best interest of the child, and that it is the public
67 policy of this state to encourage parents to participate in decisions affecting the health, education
68 and welfare of their children, and to resolve disputes involving their children amicably through
69 alternative dispute resolution. In order to effectuate these policies, the court shall determine the
70 custody arrangement which will best assure both parents participate in such decisions and have
71 frequent, continuing and meaningful contact with their children so long as it is in the best
72 interests of the child.

73 5. Prior to awarding the appropriate custody arrangement in the best interest of the child,
74 the court shall consider each of the following as follows:

75 (1) Joint physical and joint legal custody to both parents, which shall not be denied
76 solely for the reason that one parent opposes a joint physical and joint legal custody award. The
77 residence of one of the parents shall be designated as the address of the child for mailing and
78 educational purposes;

79 (2) Joint physical custody with one party granted sole legal custody. The residence of one
80 of the parents shall be designated as the address of the child for mailing and educational
81 purposes;

82 (3) Joint legal custody with one party granted sole physical custody;

83 (4) Sole custody to either parent; or

84 (5) Third-party custody or visitation:

85 (a) When the court finds that each parent is unfit, unsuitable, or unable to be a custodian,
86 or the welfare of the child requires, and it is in the best interests of the child, then custody,
87 temporary custody or visitation may be awarded to any other person or persons deemed by the
88 court to be suitable and able to provide an adequate and stable environment for the child. Before
89 the court awards custody, temporary custody or visitation to a third person under this
90 subdivision, the court shall make that person a party to the action;

91 (b) Under the provisions of this subsection, any person may petition the court to
92 intervene as a party in interest at any time as provided by supreme court rule.

93 6. If the parties have not agreed to a custodial arrangement, or the court determines such
94 arrangement is not in the best interest of the child, the court shall include a written finding in the
95 judgment or order based on the public policy in subsection 4 of this section and each of the
96 factors listed in subdivisions (1) to (8) of subsection 2 of this section detailing the specific
97 relevant factors that made a particular arrangement in the best interest of the child. If a proposed
98 custodial arrangement is rejected by the court, the court shall include a written finding in the
99 judgment or order detailing the specific relevant factors resulting in the rejection of such
100 arrangement.

101 7. Upon a finding by the court that either parent has refused to exchange information
102 with the other parent, which shall include but not be limited to information concerning the
103 health, education and welfare of the child, the court shall order the parent to comply immediately
104 and to pay the prevailing party a sum equal to the prevailing party's cost associated with
105 obtaining the requested information, which shall include but not be limited to reasonable
106 attorney's fees and court costs.

107 8. As between the parents of a child, no preference may be given to either parent in the
108 awarding of custody because of that parent's age, sex, or financial status, nor because of the age
109 or sex of the child. The court shall not presume that a parent, solely because of his or her sex,
110 is more qualified than the other parent to act as a joint or sole legal or physical custodian for the
111 child.

112 9. Any judgment providing for custody shall include a specific written parenting plan
113 setting forth the terms of such parenting plan arrangements specified in subsection 8 of section
114 452.310. Such plan may be a parenting plan submitted by the parties pursuant to section 452.310
115 or, in the absence thereof, a plan determined by the court, but in all cases, the custody plan
116 approved and ordered by the court shall be in the court's discretion and shall be in the best
117 interest of the child.

118 10. After August 28, 2016, every court order establishing or modifying custody or
119 visitation shall include the following language: "In the event of noncompliance with this order,
120 the aggrieved party may file a verified motion for contempt. If custody, visitation, or third-party
121 custody is denied or interfered with by a parent or third party without good cause, the aggrieved
122 person may file a family access motion with the court stating the specific facts that constitute a
123 violation of the custody provisions of the judgment of dissolution, legal separation, or judgment
124 of paternity. The circuit clerk will provide the aggrieved party with an explanation of the
125 procedures for filing a family access motion and a simple form for use in filing the family access
126 motion. A family access motion does not require the assistance of legal counsel to prepare and
127 file."

128 11. No court shall adopt any local rule, form, or practice requiring a standardized or
129 default parenting plan for interim, temporary, or permanent orders or judgments.
130 Notwithstanding any other provision **of law** to the contrary, a court may enter an interim order
131 in a proceeding under this chapter, provided that the interim order shall not contain any
132 provisions about child custody or a parenting schedule or plan without first providing the parties
133 with notice and a hearing, unless the parties otherwise agree.

134 12. Unless a parent has been denied custody rights pursuant to this section or visitation
135 rights under section 452.400, both parents shall have access to records and information
136 pertaining to a minor child including, but not limited to, medical, dental, and school records. If
137 the parent without custody has been granted restricted or supervised visitation because the court
138 has found that the parent with custody or any child has been the victim of domestic violence, as
139 defined in section 455.010, by the parent without custody, the court may order that the reports
140 and records made available pursuant to this subsection not include the address of the parent with
141 custody or the child. Unless a parent has been denied custody rights pursuant to this section or
142 visitation rights under section 452.400, any judgment of dissolution or other applicable court
143 order shall specifically allow both parents access to such records and reports.

144 13. Except as otherwise precluded by state or federal law, if any individual, professional,
145 public or private institution or organization denies access or fails to provide or disclose any and
146 all records and information, including, but not limited to, past and present dental, medical and
147 school records pertaining to a minor child, to either parent upon the written request of such
148 parent, the court shall, upon its finding that the individual, professional, public or private
149 institution or organization denied such request without good cause, order that party to comply
150 immediately with such request and to pay to the prevailing party all costs incurred, including, but
151 not limited to, attorney's fees and court costs associated with obtaining the requested information.
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153 14. An award of joint custody does not preclude an award of child support pursuant to
154 section 452.340 and applicable supreme court rules. The court shall consider the factors
155 contained in section 452.340 and applicable supreme court rules in determining an amount
156 reasonable or necessary for the support of the child.

157 15. If the court finds that domestic violence or abuse as defined in section 455.010 has
158 occurred, the court shall make specific findings of fact to show that the custody or visitation
159 arrangement ordered by the court best protects the child and the parent or other family or
160 household member who is the victim of domestic violence, as defined in section 455.010, and
161 any other children for whom such parent has custodial or visitation rights from any further harm.

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
